Raise awareness about hunger statistics, food date labels, decreasing food waste at home, and where to find help. Activity sign-ups run all year round.

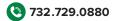
Create a dedicated club or sub-group within an existing service club to establish Youth Liaisons within a local food pantry

The goal of this long-term partnership is for students to learn more about community food security while providing continuous support to their local food pantry as opposed to one-and-done volunteer opportunities.

Club advisor & members should work closely with food pantry directors and adult volunteers to resolve current challenges such as:

Consistency of labor; Support for physically demanding activities; Social media literacy; Using social media for client directives during community emergencies; Succession: planning for long-time volunteer retirements; Language translation; Intercultural communications support for food pantry workers (to serve clients from diverse backgrounds with better ease).

ISBN 9780192749239

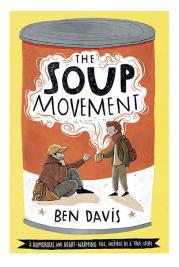
A thermos of soup and an unintended encounter with a homeless man leads Jordan to learn how a little empathy and an open mind can be life-changing for both givers and recipients of help.

Simulation Activities

Life's Journey Game

A game that highlights how inequity can dupe success in life despite doing all the right things.

Inequity Snack Time (Roots of Hunger)

Students experience class distinctions and associated food security through the food they are served. Student can discuss how they felt about their food, how it made them feel amongst their peers, and what did it motivate them to do next.

Inequality Marshmallow Activity

Students are given variable amounts of resources to construct a tower, some have additional privileges and others don't. Review the finished structures and have each group explain the ease or challenge in which they experienced in successfully completing their assignment. You may frame this activity in the context of economic inequity or food insecurity as they are intertwined.

Tip: Use marshmallow brands made without gelatin to be courteous to Halal, Kosher, vegetarian needs.

Minimum Wage Activity

Students have to research the monthly expenses of a fully-employed household with 1 adult and 1 child on a NJ minimum wage income. Students discuss how easy or hard it is to balance a budget, be food secure, and/or plan for the future. Brainstorm possible solutions and identify available community resources to families to tap into for support. Share project results with us.

Optional: Hypothesize how results might change with: The addition of another child?
