CHAPTER 1: INTRODUCTION

A. Middlesex County Background

Middlesex County is located in the geographic center of New Jersey, just 25 miles from New York City and 45 miles from Philadelphia. The 2019 census population figure was 825,062, the second largest County in the State. The labor force during 2019 reached 523,165 according to the US Census Bureau.

Industrial development in Middlesex County is flourishing; with industrial parks, situated on or near major roadways, that serve as home to research centers and to large drug, pharmaceutical and chemical companies, manufacturers of electric appliances, cosmetics, perfumes, and toys. Large and small family-operated businesses continue to proliferate in Middlesex County.

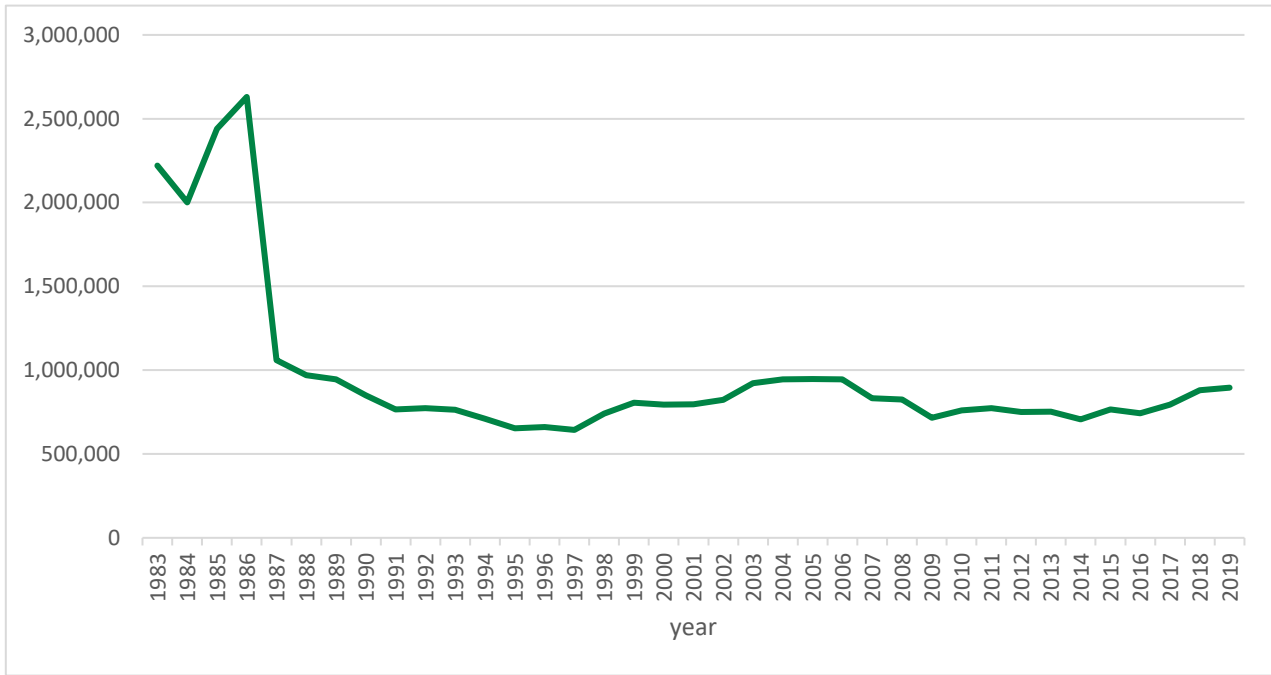
There are several fine hospitals in Middlesex County, an extensive system of public, parochial schools, and County vocational-technical high schools, as well as Rutgers University and Middlesex County College. In addition to these services, recreational and cultural facilities abound in Middlesex County.

The Middlesex County Board of County Commissioners and the Planning Department recognized at an early point in time that management of solid waste disposal in the County was an urgent priority. The first solid waste management plan was prepared in 1973. Programs of public education and explorations of the possibilities of using high technology incineration began in the 1970's. Middlesex County established its Department of Solid Waste Management in April of 1975.

In 1992 the Department was combined with the environmental section of the Health Department to form the Department of Environmental Health. In 1994, Solid Waste Management again became its own Department. In 1995, the Department was placed in the Planning Department as the Division of Solid Waste Management. In 2012, the Division was moved to the Department of Public Safety and Health. The DSWM is now officially a part of the Division of Environmental Health. The County Solid Waste Advisory Council is composed of interested and articulate citizens and officials guiding solid waste planning and advising the Commissioners on solid waste matters. The County SWAC has met continuously on a monthly basis since the late 1970's.

Middlesex County's current waste disposal facilities include the Middlesex County Landfill and a number of transfer stations. Prior to 1988, a significant portion of the waste from several counties was disposed in commercial landfills in Middlesex County, consuming disposal capacities that would have served Middlesex County's needs for many years.

The tons of waste disposed of by Middlesex County for the last 34 years are as follows:



Solid Waste Planning in Middlesex County is conducted in cooperation with the MCEHD’s Solid Waste Enforcement Group, the MCUA, and the MCIA. As a result of legislation, solid waste management includes cooperation with the MCEHD in planning and implementing County regulations of waste disposal operations under Chapter 443, the Environmental Health Act. As a result of a Freeholder decision in 1987, the operation of the Middlesex County Landfill has been assigned to the MCUA. Another Freeholder Board decision in 1994 assigned the implementation of the County-wide curbside recycling and yard waste programs to the MCIA.

The challenges of solid waste management in Middlesex County are numerous. The County generates about 2200 tons of refuse for disposal per day, and 5900 tons per day for recycling. Recycling education must reach a diverse suburban, urban, and rural population as well as approximately 29,600 businesses. The strategies outlined in this edition of the Solid Waste Management Plan address these diverse problems.

B. The Plan Update and Provisions for Changes

The Update of the Solid Waste Management Plan is not a new Solid Waste Plan. It is a codification of previously approved provisions up to and including Administrative Action 007-22, which have been adopted by the County and certified by the NJ DEP Commissioners since the 2012 Plan was approved. The Solid Waste Advisory Council was so advised. No County Commissioner approval or NJ DEP Commissioner Certification is anticipated for this volume. This update does, however, include current information on population, amounts of waste disposed, ten-year projections of waste disposal, and County recycling program activities that do not require formal Plan inclusion for implementation. Minor changes have been made to reflect program updates and Administrative Action 006-22 was adopted to properly insert those changes into this Plan.

Procedures for adopting Major Plan Amendments and Administrative Actions

Major plan amendments are defined in N.J.A.C. 7:26-6.10 and include items such as inclusion of new solid waste facilities. Administrative Actions are defined in N.J.A.C. 7:26-6.11 and include minor actions such as adding additional materials to an approved recycling facility. Chapter 3E has specific information regarding which types of facilities are included via Administrative Action.

Outlined below are the approval procedures for Major Amendments and Administrative Actions to the Middlesex County Solid Waste Management Plan.

Major Amendments are subject to the following procedures:

1. Review by DSWM staff to ensure SWAC criteria and staff concerns are met.
2. Presentation at two or more SWAC meetings.
3. SWAC Subcommittee site inspection, if applicable.
4. SWAC vote on the proposed amendment.
5. Public hearing as per N.J.A.C. 7:26 - 6.10 (c).
6. Board of County Commissioners resolution adopting or rejecting the amendment.
7. Submission of the amendment and all required back-up to the NJ Department of Environmental Protection, Division of Solid and Hazardous Waste.
8. Certification of the amendment by the NJ Department of Environmental Protection.

Administrative Actions (formerly minor amendments) are subject to the following procedures:

1. Review by DSWM staff to ensure SWAC criteria and staff concerns are met.
2. Presentation at one or more SWAC meetings.
3. SWAC Subcommittee site inspection, if applicable.
4. SWAC vote on the proposed Administrative Action.
5. If approved by the County DSWM, a District Plan Amendment checklist with a copy of the Administrative Action and back-up is forwarded by the DSWM to the NJ Department of Environmental Protection.
6. Approval of the Administrative Action by the NJ Department of Environmental Protection.

Plan Amendments will be approved or rejected by the Board of County Commissioners within 270 days after successful completion of step 1 above. In the event of unanticipated issues and with the mutual agreement of both the applicant and the County, the time frame shall be extended up to an additional 90 days.

Administrative Actions will be approved or rejected by the County within 180 days after successful completion of step 1 above. In the event of unanticipated issues and with the mutual agreement of both the applicant and the County, the time frame shall be extended up to an additional 60 days.

CHAPTER 2: REPORTS AND MAPS

The Solid Waste Management Act requires a report on current waste quantities being generated, the sources of that waste, and the composition of that waste.

A. Solid Waste Generation Quantities, Sources, and Composition

1. Current Waste Quantities and Sources 2019

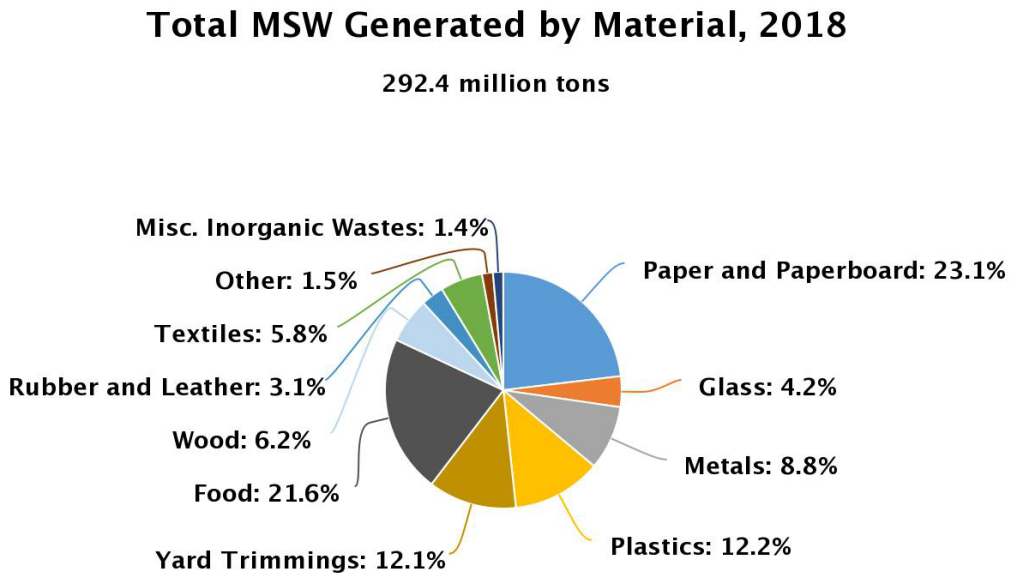
The most recent full year for which final data is available is 2019. During that year 558,470 tons of waste were disposed at the Middlesex County Landfill. According to other NJ Solid Waste Facility reports, 336,513 tons of County waste were disposed of using out of County facilities. The overall total tons disposed was 894,983.

In addition to waste disposed, a complete report on the amount of waste generated must include recycling of materials such as newspaper, bottles, cans, plastic, corrugated cardboard, paper, tree stumps, scrap wood, concrete rubble, white goods, and leaves. The total amount of material recycled in 2019 was 2,023,651 tons or 69.34 percent of total waste (2,918,634 tons) generated.

Appendix VII shows by municipality for 2019 the amount of each type of recyclable collected, the total amount of waste disposed and the calculation of the percentage of recycled material versus total waste.

2. Waste Composition

B. Solid Waste Projections

Ten Year Projection of Waste Generation

The Solid Waste Management Act requires that the District Plan include a ten-year projection of waste generation. Waste projections are intended as a loose guideline to plan for future disposal capacity. Waste generation can be significantly affected by business cycles, changing patterns of residential and business development, changes in packaging, differences in disposal costs in various counties, and many other factors which can be difficult to predict accurately.

Below are some general comments on the difficulty in projecting waste generation for the next ten years.

- This is not a household waste statistic but results from dividing total waste generated by total population. Therefore, using population projections to estimate future waste generation may not be very accurate.
- A county with major manufacturing and warehousing activity such as Middlesex County will show higher waste generation per capita than a primarily residential county. It is difficult to project waste generation amounts for industries, because the varying amounts of waste generated by each type of industry and projecting the future growth for each type of industry must be taken into consideration.
- A county with substantially lower disposal charges - such as Middlesex - than surrounding counties will tend to show an apparent higher waste generation rate than counties with higher disposal rates. This is still true even though the Middlesex County Landfill does not accept out of County waste.

Updated Ten Year Projection of Generated Waste Amounts

From 2010-2019, the average generation rate of all waste (Types 10, 13, 23, 25, 27, disposed and recycled) in Middlesex County was approximately 18 pounds/person/day. Using that figure and the population projections as provided by the Middlesex County Office of Planning, the projected waste generation is as follows:

Of the waste generated by Middlesex County each year, a significant percentage is recycled. Below is a table which shows total tons recycled and disposed of per year, the population of the County, and the split between pounds per person per day disposed and recycled from 1987 through 2019.

C. Facilities: Solid Waste and Recycling

This section of the Plan deals with existing and proposed solid waste and recycling facilities. On successive pages are lists and maps showing:

1. Recycling Facilities (including Compost Facilities)
2. Transfer Stations and Landfill Facilities
3. Medical Waste Facilities

The facilities on the charts are coded with a mapping index number in the first column. Inclusion in these lists or on maps does not represent State approval. Check the Status of Approval column for this information.

In addition to the types of facilities listed above and described in the following pages, the DSWM maintains a list of closed disposal facilities in Middlesex County as reported by the municipalities.

Guide to the Charts:

The number in the lower right of the first column on the charts is the mapping index number which is used to identify the facility on the subsequent maps. On the charts with a "County Plan Included" column, the numbers indicate whether the facility was included or amended via

- Plan Amendment (indicated by a full year - amendment number i.e. 1997-3)
- Administrative Action (indicated by a three-digit amendment number - last two digits for the year i.e. 007-98)
- Blanket inclusion (indicated by a BI-amendment number-last two digits for the year i.e. BI-1-94)
- Grandfathered (indicated by a "GF").

Any entry marked "NA" means that the facility was not required to secure the type of approval referred to by the column title.

Guide to the various classes of recycling facilities:

Class A - includes facilities accepting materials such as aluminum, glass, paper, cardboard, plastic, and bimetal cans.

Class B - includes facilities accepting materials such as cinder, concrete, brick, block, asphalt, stumps, pallets, and tires.

Class C - includes facilities accepting compostable materials such as leaves, grass, and brush.

Class D - includes facilities accepting motor oil and universal waste materials.

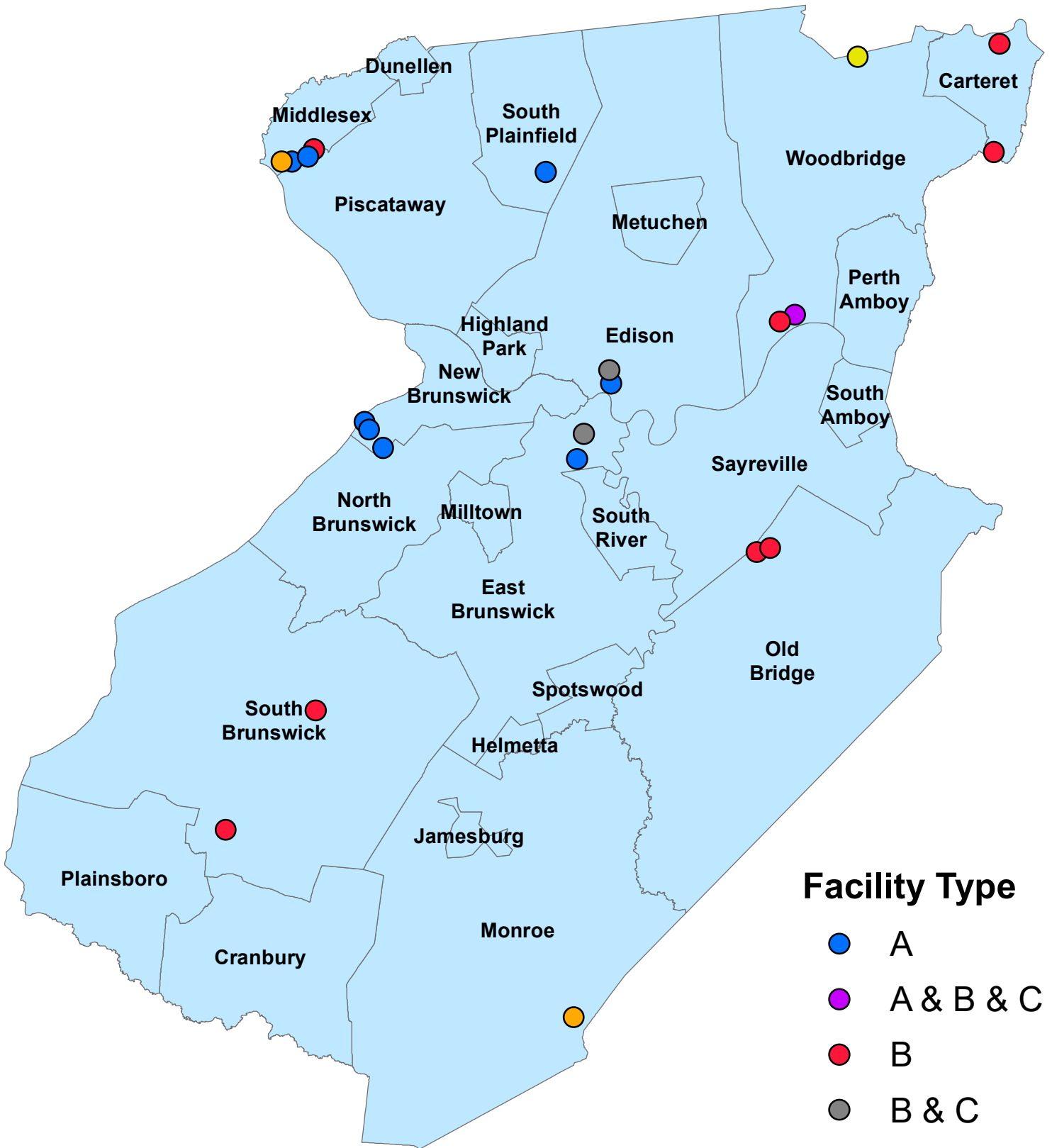

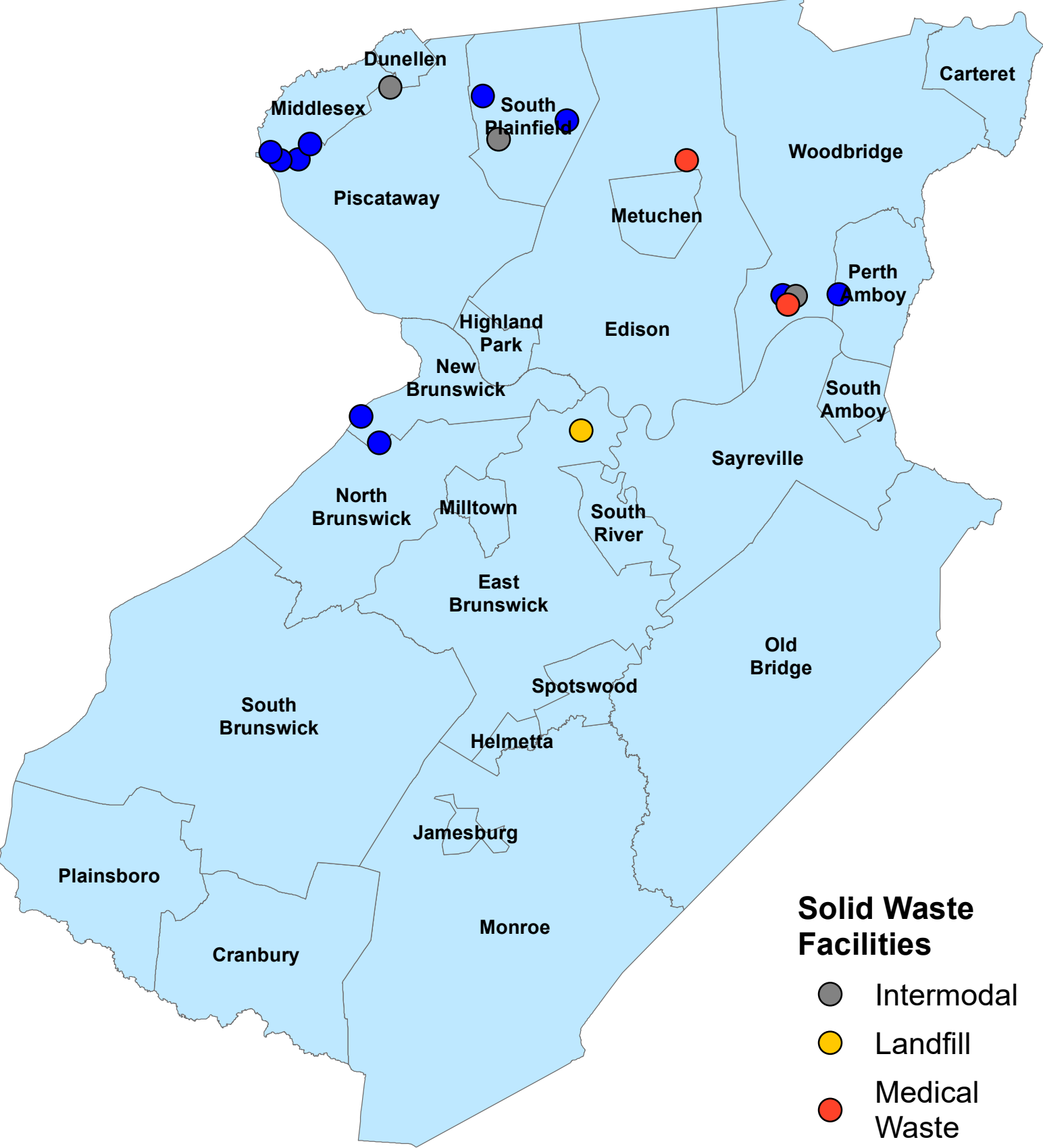

D. Solid Waste - Waste Flow Control

As a result of the United States Supreme Court not hearing the State's appeal of the Third Circuit Court of Appeals decision concerning New Jersey's waste flow rules, (Atlantic Coast Demolition and Recycling Inc. et. al. vs. Board of Chosen Freeholders of Atlantic County et. al.) it was necessary to ensure that economic and environmentally sound solid waste and recycling programs continue in accordance with NJ DEP revised promulgated regulations. In response to this need, Middlesex County adopted the following solid waste management and disposal procedures.

1. All solid waste generators within Middlesex County (public and private) must dispose of their waste at any properly licensed solid waste facility which complies with applicable law. The waste flow rules formerly contained in this section of the Middlesex County Solid Waste Management Plan are no longer applicable. The County opts for a market participant system and solid waste facilities shall rely on voluntary contracts to secure a Middlesex County generated waste stream.
2. The MCUA will continue to operate the Middlesex County Landfill for Middlesex County generated waste only.
3. All solid waste generators in Middlesex County will be charged Solid Waste Management Service Fees, payable through haulers to the MCUA, for county-wide programs undertaken by (1) the MCEHD related to enforcement; (2) the County Division of Solid Waste related to planning, public outreach/education, and community projects; (3) the MCIA related to recycling and associated activities; and (4) the MCUA related to solid waste tracking/reporting, program activities and recordkeeping. The applicable fees will become effective on solid waste collected and hauled within Middlesex County after January 1, 1998 and will be payable to the MCUA after the date of the NJ DEP Certification of this Amendment (which was January 21, 1998), for all waste generated in Middlesex County. Fees will be assessed on a per ton basis. Waste collected commingled with recyclables will be assessed on a per ton basis for the total weight of the material before the recyclables are separated out.
4. All solid waste haulers collecting and transporting Middlesex County waste will be required to continue reporting the origin and tonnage of waste being disposed by each municipality. Disposal of waste at the Middlesex County Landfill will be reported at that facility through the origin and destination forms. Disposal at any other solid waste facility will be reported monthly by each hauler. The monthly report must consist of hauler and/or facility summaries based upon certified weights and is to be submitted to the MCUA by the 15th of the month following the reporting month. Solid waste haulers who are in compliance with the Middlesex County Solid Waste Management Plan shall self weigh at a scale which is certified and registered with Weights and Measures and self report in lieu of in-district weighing for tonnage verification and for the payment of the Middlesex County Solid Waste Management Service Fee.

Any hauler failing to comply with those provisions of the Plan pertaining to recordkeeping, reporting and payment obligations covering all solid waste generated in Middlesex County but not disposed at the Middlesex County Landfill, may be required to weigh at the Middlesex County Landfill prior to out of district disposal. The MCEHD shall be responsible for enforcement

of this provision. All applicable fees associated with the use of the Landfill scales are the responsibility of the hauler.

The penalties for failure to weigh at the Middlesex County Landfill after being required shall be those contained in Appendix VI - MCEHD Enforcement Protocol and Penalties: “Non-submittal and/or falsification of Monthly Tonnage Report; and/or nonpayment of Solid Waste Management fees”.

5. Any solid waste hauler failing to comply with the recordkeeping, reporting, and payment obligations contained in this Plan Amendment will be subject to enforcement sanctions. (Refer to Appendix VI)
6. (a) All solid waste generators must engage the services of a solid waste hauler which is duly licensed by the State of New Jersey for collecting and transporting solid waste to a disposal facility of choice which complies with applicable law.
(b) All contracts between solid waste generators and solid waste haulers must specify that the hauler is required to comply with the County Plan.
7. In the event a municipality that collects and transports solid waste or a municipally-contracted hauler who collects and transports solid waste fails to comply with the provisions of this Amendment, certain solid waste services described herein provided by the County and County designated agencies to the municipality may be terminated.
8. Haulers collecting commingled recyclables and solid waste from Middlesex County generators pursuant to site specific municipal approvals where the solid waste residual of the mixture does not exceed fifteen percent (15 percent) by weight of the hauler container load shall be exempt from paying the Middlesex County Solid Waste Management Services (SWMS) Fee on the portion of the separated recyclables successfully marketed. For purposes of determining the amount to be exempted, the percentage separation of recyclables and solid waste determined by certified scales from a non merchant intermediate processing facility(ies) properly licensed by jurisdiction of location may be utilized by the hauler to determine the amount of mixture exemption from payment of the fee provided that such documentation is provided at the time of filing of the required Middlesex County report forms and fee payment.
9. If a receiving facility, i.e. a transfer station/MRF, brings waste for final disposal at the County Landfill and when the SWMS fee was already paid by the hauler using that receiving facility, the transfer station/MRF may be eligible to receive a rebate of the amount of the SWMS fee per ton of waste brought back for disposal. This could occur if a hauler takes a load of waste to a transfer station (which requires the payment of the SWMS fee), and then that transfer station brings the waste to the landfill and pays the fee again (the fee is included within the tip fee at the landfill). The transfer station may apply for a rebate of the SWMS fee that it has paid within the tip fee. The rebate will be on a per ton basis for the amount of tons delivered to the County Landfill for disposal. The MCUA will administer the rebate program. As a condition of the prospective rebate, the transfer station must provide to the MCUA a copy of the NJ DEP monthly report containing the names of haulers who delivered waste and the amount of that waste to their transfer facility. The rebate will only be issued if the transfer station/MRF is in full compliance with the NJ DEP

regulations and the Middlesex County Solid Waste Management Plan, and if it is verified that those haulers did in fact pay the required SWMS fee.

10. The Solid Waste Management Service Fee for 2022 is as follows:

1.	County Enforcement Program	\$0.82/ton
2.	County Solid Waste Mgmt.	\$1.15/ton
3.	MCIA Programs	\$6.00/ton
4.	MCUA Programs	<u>\$2.50/ton</u>

Total \$10.47/ton

These rates may be adjusted through the MCUA budget process.

Solid Waste Management Service Fees Explanation

Plan Amendment 1997-3 contains provision for assessing Solid Waste Management Service Fees to haulers who do not utilize the County Landfill facility. Those haulers who continue to utilize the County Landfill will be charged these fees within the tip fee structure. These fees provide for (1) the MCEHD related to enforcement; (2) the DSWM related to planning, public outreach/education, and community projects; (3) the MCIA related to recycling and associated activities; and (4) the MCUA related to solid waste tracking/reporting, program activities and recordkeeping. Without the collection of these fees from haulers not utilizing the County Landfill, it would be impossible for Middlesex County to meet the requirements of the NJ DEP recently revised solid waste regulations (N.J.A.C. 7:26-1 et. seq.) and offer the same consistency, uniformity and delivery of the environmentally sound programs that currently exist.

11. MCEHD Enforcement Protocol

Any violation of those rules/regulations governing solid waste in the County of Middlesex, State of New Jersey falling under the authority of the MCEHD are subject to prosecution in the Superior Court of Middlesex County.

The violator, if found guilty, shall be liable to pay the Court Judgment to the MCEHD.

In addition, any person(s) found guilty of a solid waste violation shall be liable for all costs incurred by the County of Middlesex including all litigation costs, fees, and expenses. All fees and penalties collected that are related to prosecution shall be deposited in the Environmental Quality and Enforcement Fund (EQEF) as established, pursuant to regulation, by the County of Middlesex. Said monies shall be dedicated to the use of the County Department or certified local health agency in carrying out its responsibilities of the County Environmental Health Act.

Penalties for violations of the above requirements are contained in Appendix VI.

E. Solid Waste Haulers

Solid waste haulers known to be servicing customers in Middlesex County as of 2022 are listed in Appendix IV.

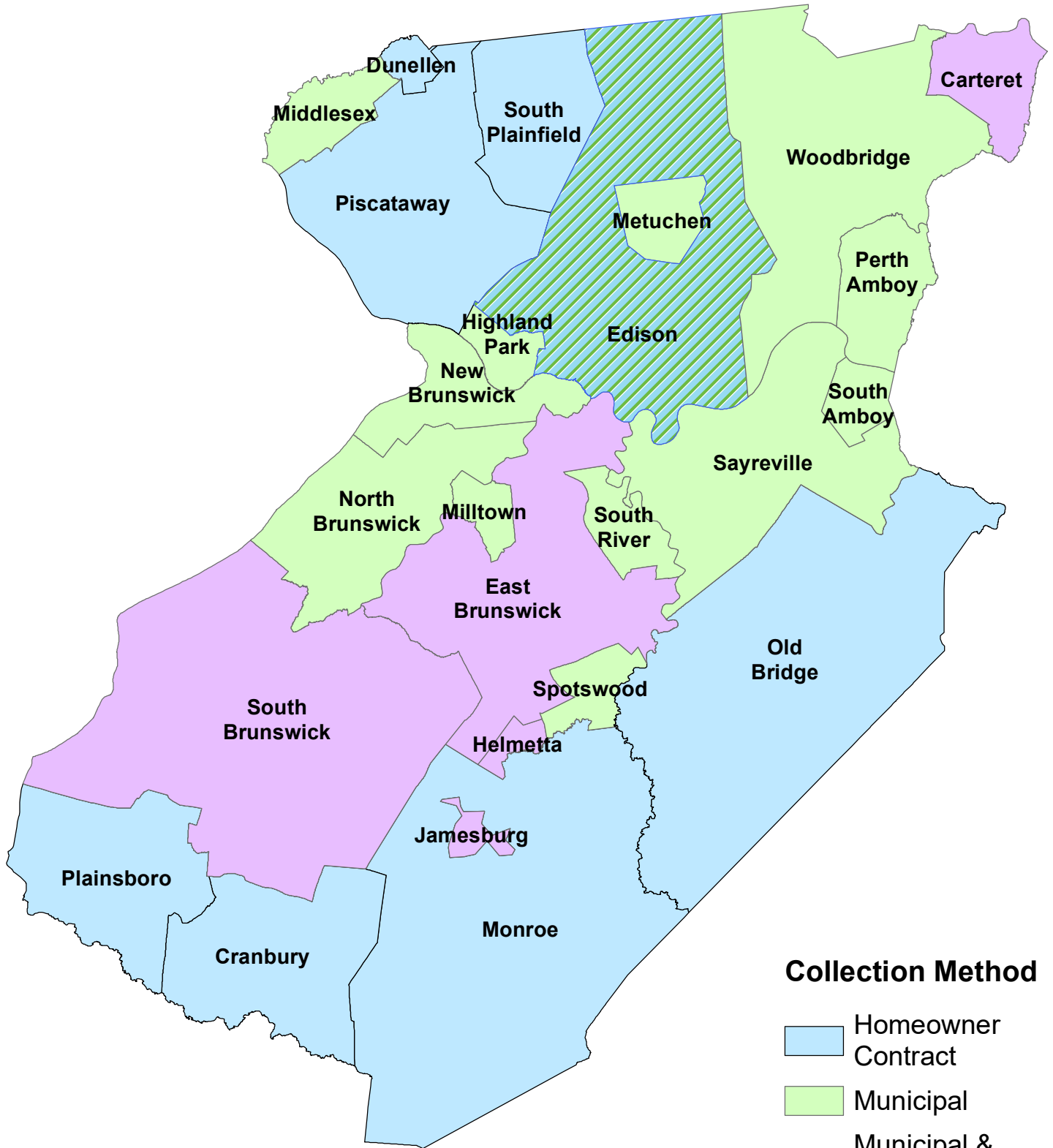

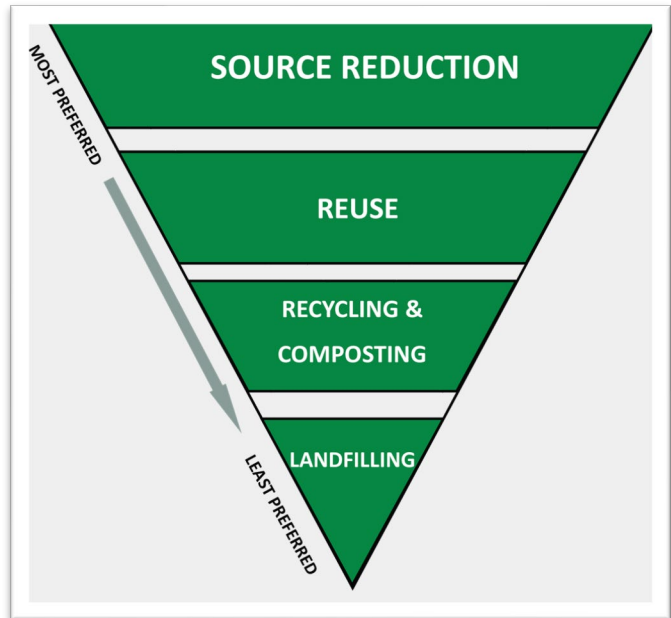
CHAPTER 3: COUNTY PLANNING – STRATEGIES

A. Designated Agencies - Planning and Implementation

The Solid Waste Management Act requires the designation of a single agency as the solid waste planning agency for each county. The County Commissioners of Middlesex County have designated the DSWM as their planning agency. (1)

The MCUA is designated as the implementing agency responsible for operating the Middlesex County Landfill.

The MCIA is designated as the County agency responsible for implementation of the recycling programs named in Plan Amendment 1994-2, specifically the curbside recycling program and the yard waste program.



The DSWM is designated as the implementing agency for all other solid waste and recycling programs including, but not limited to, Household Hazardous Waste and Paper Shred events.

B. Strategies

The following are the elements of the County's waste management strategies in order of priority:

1. Source Reduction

The Governor's Task Force Report and the "Solid Waste Policy Guidelines" issued by the NJDEP in 1991 call for certain source reduction measures that will "...cap 1990 per capita generation of waste, cap total waste generation within five years and then reduce total waste generation within ten years."

The following Source Reduction measures are being implemented on the County level:

- a) A "Cut it and Leave it" campaign was instituted to convince Middlesex County residents to adopt new lawn maintenance habits and leave cut grass on their lawns. The DSWM has and will continue to work with the Rutgers Cooperative Extension Service to hold backyard composting seminars and educate residents at County and municipal events.
- b) An education program is in place to promote buying materials with less packaging or materials that are less toxic, reusing shopping bags, and mugs and decreasing the amount of junk mail that people receive. The county will continue to provide programs aimed at

educating residents to take responsibility for reducing the amount of waste that they generate.

c) The DSWM has expanded its previous twice per year collection of household hazardous waste (HHW) to the current six collections each year. Approximately 4,000 residents participate in our HHW events each year. These are one day events held at municipal public works and County facilities. The County hires a licensed hazardous waste contractor, who packs and properly disposes of the material. In 1998, fluorescent light bulbs were added to the list of acceptable materials at the HHW events. A 1992 Plan Amendment also called for the examination of the potential siting of a permanent Household Hazardous Waste Facility (1992-2). This option was evaluated by the DSWM and SWAC. A Minor Modification was passed (005-96) in 1996 that recommended a drop-off HHW program as follows:

1. Initiate a paint recycling program, which will help to manage over 50 percent of the HHW stream. The proposed program includes:
 - Establishing 6 or more drop-off locations (either municipal or County) where any County resident will be able to drop off latex and oil-based paint (and possibly stains, thinners, and varnishes, etc.) during specified hours.
 - A contractor will be retained to service the drop-offs (pick up products in original containers) and transport, recycle and/ or dispose of the material.
 - The drop-offs will most likely be provided with a standardized container/ storage facility to place the paints in.
2. Continue to conduct single day events held at the same locations each time. If funding permits, increase the number of events.
 - Establish 2 or more locations to hold one day events similar to the current practice. The paint program will help to reduce the volume of waste received and should also reduce the cost thus providing a possible source of funding to increase the number of events.
 - Keep the locations the same and have the events at the same time each month (i.e. third Saturday/Sunday) to help provide consistency and increase awareness of the program. Other NJ Counties who have held the events in the same place each year have had far better participation than Middlesex County.
3. Continue and expand the development of an educational program to aid in better public education as to the proper disposal and reduction techniques for HHW.
 - Publicize the days and hours of both the single day collection events and permanent paint drop-offs.
 - Educate residents in ways to reduce the amount of HHW that they must dispose (i.e. buying only what they need, using less toxic alternatives).
 - Inform residents about the proper ways to recycle motor oil and the location of the drop-offs for motor oil around the County.

The paint program was implemented in May 1997. Eight (8) drop-off sites for paint were situated around the County. At least one drop-off is open every Saturday (except in months where there is a fifth Saturday). The drop-offs accept latex paint, oil-based paint, stains, varnishes, aerosol paints, lacquers, and thinners. The County's highly successful Paint Drop-off Program was expanded to a total

of ten (10) sites. Since its inception through 2021, the program has been utilized by 124,424 residents who delivered paint weighing 7,071 tons.

- e) Household Battery Recycling Program: This program included over 50 drop-off locations, with at least one drop-off in each municipality as well as several consolidation locations. From 1995 through 2010, the program received over 444,000 pounds/222 tons of batteries. In 2010, due to regulatory changes and less hazardous battery compositions, Middlesex County residents were informed that they should dispose of their alkaline batteries in the regular trash. In June 2011, the County Household Battery Collection Program changed. Containers for button cell batteries only are provided by the County, and the button cells are properly disposed of through HHW events. Municipalities have been encouraged to continue their local drop-offs, by participating in the Call2Recycle's free program for recycling of rechargeable batteries. Rechargeable and button cell batteries are still accepted at HHW events. In 2021, the County embarked on an educational campaign "Avoid the Spark", in partnership with Call2Recycle, ANJR and ANJHHWC to inform residents of the dangers and the potential for fires when rechargeable batteries are disposed of improperly.
- f) The DSWM will continue to assist municipalities and provide information on various waste collection strategies, including a per-container system so that they may choose the best strategy for their municipality.
- g) All County departments and offices, municipalities, school districts, independent public authorities, and public institutions operating in Middlesex County have been encouraged to adopt source reduction practices, including purchasing two-sided copiers, buying in bulk, purchasing items with minimal packaging, purchasing products based on their recyclability, reuse, or repairability, and purchasing materials made from recycled products.
- h) Consumer Electronics Recycling Program: The County's Consumer Electronics Program began in 2001. Middlesex County's contract specifies the vendor must provide and staff a primary drop-off location in Middlesex County for residents to conveniently deliver consumer electronics. Acceptable items include televisions, computers and peripherals, fluorescent bulbs, and mercury containing devices. In 2005, two municipal drop-offs opened in Sayreville and Monroe for their respective residents and by the end of 2007 there were 12 municipal drop-offs in operation. Since its inception in 2001 through 2010, the program has generated 5,864,251 pounds/2,932.12 tons of electronics. In 2011, the Electronic Waste Management Act took effect which requires the recycling of all computers and televisions. Each municipality has the option of working with an authorized recycler who provides a no cost service to towns who wish to have a drop-off system. For those towns who do not have a system, there are a few private options for the free service.
- i) Mercury Thermometer Exchange Program: The Mercury Thermometer Exchange Program began in 2004 with a one-day collection event held in conjunction with our Consumer Electronics Drop-off event. Since that time through 2010, there have been 60 collection events that have resulted in more than 4,714 thermometers received from over 3,306 residents. The purpose of this program was to educate the public on the dangers of exposure to mercury and to encourage residents to properly recycle their mercury thermometer(s). A mercury-free

digital thermometer was provided free of charge to each resident who brought in a mercury containing thermometer(s).

- j) CFC Recycling Program: The DSWM became aware several years ago that chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs) from certain appliances collected by the municipalities were not being collected properly. To encourage the proper and legal removal of CFCs, the DSWM, in 2002, implemented a program whereby participating municipalities are reimbursed a portion of the costs incurred to properly recover/recycle the CFCs. The DSWM evaluates and approves the vendor(s) that can be used by municipalities. Since its inception in 2002 through 2021, the results of the program have been the collection of 30,763 refrigerators, and 27,705 air conditioners weighing 6,363,242 pounds/3,181.62 tons and capture of 70,793 pounds/35.4 tons of CFCs.
- k) Propane Tanks: In 2002, manufacturers were required by law to install new valves - overfill prevention devices (OPDs) on propane tanks to prevent the overfilling of tanks. Old tanks without this new valve were prohibited from being refilled in New Jersey. Due to these new regulations, many residents had non-compliant tanks requiring recycling. To address this large influx of tanks, the DSWM organized propane tank consolidation events. Tanks were consolidated at three municipal recycling yards and were picked up at no cost by an out of state market. Additionally, tanks were handled through our HHW events. Since 2002 through 2021, 40,583 tanks were recycled. The DSWM plans to continue this project as needed.

2. Recycling Plan and Municipal Programs

See Chapter 3, Section C

3. Waste Diversion of Bulky Waste

Recycling of waste wood, concrete, large tree parts, and other construction materials has been encouraged by the cost of disposal. Private industry generates most of these materials and private industry has responded to the need to divert a good portion of these materials from the waste stream to approved recycling facilities. The Facilities section of this Plan lists several Class B recycling facilities operating in Middlesex County. The County will support inclusion of these facilities in the County Plan as long as the impacts on citizens, neighboring businesses, and the environment are minimal.

4. Composting

See Chapter 3, Section C9

5. Transfer Stations

Transfer Stations associated with out-of-state disposal strategies are not part of the County's strategy at this time. Municipalities and private waste haulers may choose to obtain approval for transfer stations that reduce waste management costs or improve collection service. A list of transfer stations operating in Middlesex County is in Chapter 2, Section C.

6. Landfill

In August 1987, the Middlesex County Board of Chosen Freeholders approved a Plan Amendment designating the Middlesex County Landfill (originally designated as Edgeboro Landfill Phase II Expansion) as the County's long term disposal site. The MCUA obtained the original permit for that landfill in May 1991.

In 2015, Middlesex County adopted a Plan Amendment that allowed the MCUA to increase the height of the Landfill by 55 feet to an elevation of 220 feet above mean sea level. This height increase will provide for an approximate 7.9 million cubic yards of additional capacity which will extend the life of the Landfill until about year 2030. The NJDEP approved that permit request in 2017.

In 2021, Middlesex County adopted a Plan Amendment that would allow the MCUA to increase the height of the Landfill by 55 feet to an elevation of 275 feet above mean sea level, which would provide an additional 4.7 million cubic yards of additional capacity and extend the life of the Landfill until about the year 2034. That NJDEP approved the Plan Amendment in 2022.

The Middlesex County Landfill, operated by the MCUA, is located on Edgeboro Road in the Township of East Brunswick near the confluence of the Raritan and South Rivers. The Middlesex County Landfill relies on double composite high density polyethylene (HDPE) liners with a full site leachate collection system and a separate leak detection system constructed on a three-foot-thick clay layer designed to impede any discharge of landfill generated liquid into ground or surface waters. By virtue of its piggybacked construction on top of the former, now closed, Edgeboro Landfill, the Middlesex County Landfill incorporated the former facility's bentonite slurry cut off wall as a redundant groundwater migration barrier.

Constructed to meet Federal EPA Subtitle D and New Jersey DEP landfill performance standards, the Middlesex County Landfill has installed a landfill gas collection system which collects potential odoriferous and greenhouse gases regulated under the Federal and State Clean Air Act. The methane gas is then transported via pipelines to the Electric Power Generating Facility in Sayreville, owned and operated by the MCUA Wastewater Division. There, the gas is converted into 16-megawatts of electrical energy which is used to power the MCUA's operations in Sayreville. Collected Landfill leachate is transmitted to the MCUA Wastewater Treatment Facility.

7. Contingency Plan

In the event of a complete loss of landfill capacity, Middlesex County would either use known brokers and transportation companies to obtain long-haul transportation to out-of-state facilities or negotiate with other NJ counties that have existing in-state capacity.

Note: On October 26, 1992 the NJDEP certified a Plan Amendment which removed the proposed incinerator (to be located in Sayreville) and removed incineration as a disposal option from this Plan. Prior to that time, incineration had been a disposal strategy for Middlesex County although no incinerator had been constructed.

8. Measures to reduce the Health risks associated with the West Nile Virus regarding the storage and proper disposal/recycling of scrap tires.

Middlesex County has been working diligently to reduce the health threat posed by the West Nile virus. Improperly stored or illegally disposed tires can collect water and have the potential to become breeding grounds for mosquitoes. To reduce this potential, Middlesex County tire generators

(residential, institutional, government, and commercial) and establishments that receive tires at the end of their useful lives, including tires on or off rims, (hereinafter scrap tires) must adhere to the following rules:

- a) All scrap tires must be properly recycled. Middlesex County residents may drop off up to four residentially generated scrap tires at one of the County's four Tire Drop-Off centers. Commercial, government or institutional generators may contact the DSWM for a list of licensed recycling facilities or may contract with a licensed hauler for removal.
- b) If there are more than 5 scrap tires on site, the scrap tires must be stored in totally enclosed structures, closed trailers, or covered roll-off containers.
- c) Scrap tires must be removed from the site within six months.
- d) The provisions of this section are enforceable by the MCEHD or its designee. Violators shall be subject to notices of violations and penalty assessments as set forth in Appendix VI – Scrap Tire Enforcement Protocol and Penalties, as well as any administrative, legal, and court costs of the County of Middlesex and its autonomous bodies.

9. Clean Communities Program

Middlesex County's Clean Communities Program is a litter abatement program incorporating both cleanup and educational elements designed to provide for the collection, disposal, and dissemination of information relevant to the litter portion of the County's solid waste stream. It has been a very effective and popular program since its inception in 1986. Funding from the Program has helped Middlesex County and its municipalities to provide various programs dedicated to removing and disposing of tons of litter and debris from numerous roadways and public locations throughout Middlesex County. Specifically, Middlesex County's Clean Communities Funds are used to support such initiatives as our Adult Corrections Road Cleanup Detail Program and annual educational newspaper insert. Middlesex County will use available fees, taxes, charges and/or entitlements associated with/generated from solid waste and/or recycling programs to fund the County's Clean Communities Program(s) as may be required.

C. Recycling Plan

1. Outline of Recycling Plan Requirements

The Statewide Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act, which became law on April 20, 1987, requires that each County Solid Waste Management Plan include a formally adopted Recycling Plan. This plan must:

- a) Designate a County Recycling Coordinator position;
- b) Designate recyclable materials to be source-separated in each municipality, which shall include, in addition to leaves, at least three other materials;
- c) Designate a strategy for the collection, marketing, and disposition of recyclable materials in each municipality and designate recovery targets in each municipality to achieve the maximum feasible recovery of recyclable materials from the solid waste stream;
- d) Accord priority consideration to persons engaged in the business of recycling or otherwise lawfully providing recycling services prior to the adoption of the plan provided that person

has not discontinued these services for a period of 90 days or more between January 1, 1986 and the date on which the plan is adopted;

- e) Provide a procedure for future modifications to the Plan;
- f) Provide for enforcement;
- g) Provide for exemptions from municipal requirements for certain entities or businesses;
- h) Designate leaf composting sites; and
- i) Describe the County's publicity and education program and indicate minimum requirements for each municipal education program.

2. County Recycling Coordinator Position

The County established the full-time position of Recycling Coordinator in the DSWM many years ago and intends to maintain this position.

3. Recyclable Materials

Designated Recyclable Materials

The materials designated immediately for separation under the Plan in all municipalities are for residential (including multi-family), commercial, industrial, and institutional, governments, and office parks:

- Newspaper
- Glass Food and Beverage Containers
- Aluminum Food and Beverage Containers
- Steel Cans
- Plastic Containers
- Mixed Paper
- Corrugated Cardboard
- Leaves
- Motor Oil
- Brush
- Textiles
- Masonry/Paving Material
- Rechargeable Batteries
- Tires
- White Goods (appliances)
- Chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs) - all CFCs in any container or device must be properly evacuated by licensed individuals and all CFCs recovered must be sent to an EPA approved reclaimer.
- Covered Electronic Devices

The following materials are additional mandated materials designated for separation for commercial, industrial, and institutional, governments, and office parks:

- ◆ Fluorescent Bulbs
- ◆ Plastic Film – only for warehouses, retail establishments, and supermarkets with 25 or more employees
- ◆ Wood Scrap – only for new construction sites
- ◆ Food waste – for large generators only

Material definitions:

Newspaper - Clean dry newsprint; Generally a daily or weekly edition along with any colored inserts such as comics or advertisements.

Glass Containers - Bottles and jars in which food and beverages are packaged. The same may be transparent (clear) or translucent or tinted brown or green.

Aluminum Cans - Non-Foil food and beverage containers made entirely of aluminum.

Steel Cans - tin-plated, bi-metal, and other ferrous food and beverage containers, excluding aerosol cans.

Plastic Containers - plastic bottles, jars, and jugs made of PETE (SPI code #1) or HDPE (SPI code #2), excluding those containing or that contained household hazardous waste products.

Mixed Paper - glossy inserts, magazines, telephone books, junk mail, colored paper, computer paper, office paper, paperboard (chipboard and pressboard), non-metallic wrapping paper, soft cover books, hard cover books with covers removed and fine paper.

Corrugated Cardboard - Boxes and packaging generally made of wood pulp and consisting of two smooth sides with a corrugated inner layer. Brown paper grocery bags are included in this category.

Leaves - Fallen leaves excluding brush and grass clippings.

Motor Oil - Discarded petroleum-based or synthetic lubricating oil from automobile and other engines.

Brush - tree parts not measuring more than five inches in diameter as well as Christmas trees (excluding artificial) with lights and decorations removed

Textiles - clean dry clothing or other fabric measuring at least one foot by one foot in size.

Covered Electronic Devices – items as mandated by NJ State law. NOTE: The State Electronic Waste Management Act, that originally took effect on January 1, 2011, mandates certain electronics for recycling by all generators. Those items are currently all televisions, printers, fax machines, computer monitors, and personal computers including both desktop and laptop.

Food waste – defined by NJ State law and only applies to large generators (more than 52 tons/year)

Fluorescent bulbs – lamps that contain mercury.

Masonry/paving material – asphalt, block, brick, cinder, and concrete.

Plastic Film – stretch/shrink wrap, plastic shopping bags.

Rechargeable batteries - Nickel Cadmium (Ni-Cd), Nickel Metal Hydride (Ni-MH), Lithium Ion (Li-ion), and Small Sealed Lead (Pb).

Tires - rubber-based scrap automotive, truck, and equipment tires.

White goods (appliances) – washers, dryers, ranges, refrigerators, dehumidifiers, air conditioners.

Note: all CFCs in any white goods must be properly evacuated by licensed individuals and all CFCs recovered must be sent to an EPA approved reclaimer.

Wood Scrap – Unfinished lumber from new construction projects including pallets. Unfinished shall mean non-chemically treated (not pressure treated, impregnated with preservatives, insecticides, fungicides, creosote, or other chemicals, and not painted, resin-coated or otherwise surface treated, and not laminated or bonded; and not similarly altered from its natural condition).

Note: Any recyclables (bottles, can, jars, jugs, fiber), that cannot be clean of food are not mandated and should be discarded.

Other Materials to be considered for Recycling:

The Plan urges additional recycling and/or diversion from landfill disposal as follows:

- aseptic containers (i.e. juice boxes)
- car/truck batteries
- grass clippings
- other household batteries (button cell)
- other plastic (i.e. polystyrene, stretch film, plastic bags)
- poly-coated food and beverage containers (i.e. milk cartons)
- toner cartridges
- tree trunks and stumps
- untreated/unpainted wood including demolition debris

4. Recycling Goals

In order to assure that Middlesex County complies with the requirements of the Recycling Act, the County and each municipality in the County should have achieved the following rates of recycling:

At least 60 percent of the current year's total solid waste stream by December 31, 1995.

At least 50 percent of the current year's municipal waste stream (Types 10 and 23) by December 31, 1995.

- Countable Materials toward the 50 percent goal are determined by the NJDEP
- Calculation of Recycling Rates

The recycling rate is to be calculated as follows:

60 percent

Add solid waste (all types) disposed and total materials recycled to obtain total solid waste generated. Divide tons recycled into total solid waste generated to determine recycling rate.

50 percent

Add solid waste (types 10 and 23) disposed and total materials recycled to obtain solid waste generated. Divide countable tons recycled into solid waste generated to determine recycling rate.

Recycling rates (50 percent and 60 percent goals) calculated for each municipality and the County for 2019 are shown in Appendix VII. Subsequent years' data will be inserted as it becomes available.

Strategy to achieve the 50 percent Municipal Solid Waste (MSW) recycling goal

Middlesex County believes that we will be able to meet the 50 percent MSW recycling goal by increasing the amount of recycling of currently designated materials and by increasing the recycling of emerging mandated materials. The State recently passed a Law that mandates recycling of food waste by large generators under certain circumstances. This will assist us in reaching the 50 percent goal.

5. Responsibilities of Municipalities

a) Mandating Recycling of Materials Prescribed in County Plan

Each municipality in Middlesex County must adopt an ordinance mandating the source separation and recycling of at least the materials identified in the County's adopted and approved Plan. Municipalities may mandate other materials not designated in the County Plan. Municipalities are strongly urged not to mandate additional materials to be picked up curbside as it makes the education process for residents difficult.

b) Source Separation of Leaves

Municipal ordinances must also include source separation of leaves for composting.

c) Amending Ordinance to Mandate Additional Prescribed Materials

Municipal ordinances must be amended if additional materials in the residential, commercial, and institutional sectors are mandated for source separation through revisions of this Plan.

d) Providing a Recycling Channel for Each Mandated Material

Municipalities shall provide a system that will enable all generators to recycle each of the mandated materials unless otherwise provided for by the generator. This system may utilize either curbside collection or a drop-off center and either public or private operation.

e) Enforcement and Penalty Provisions

Municipal ordinances shall specify enforcement provisions and suitable/allowable penalties for non-compliance. Municipal ordinances shall indicate which official(s) have authority for enforcement, including issuance of warnings and violation notices. Municipal ordinances may designate the MCEHD as the enforcing agent for commercial/industrial generators. Municipal ordinances must establish a minimum fine which will be imposed for failure of solid waste generators to comply with requirements of the recycling ordinance.

f) Municipalities to Market Recyclable Materials

Each municipality shall develop a method of marketing the collected materials unless otherwise provided.

g) Municipal Responsibility for Meeting 50 percent and 60 percent Goals

Each municipality is responsible for all actions which are necessary to ensure that the 50 percent and 60 percent Countywide recycling goals are met. This includes programs of education, inspection, and enforcement. It is recommended that municipal inspection programs be conducted to determine that generators of recyclables are in compliance.

h) Municipal Recycling Education Requirements

Each municipal education program must include notification every six months to all persons occupying residential, commercial, and institutional premises concerning the municipality's recycling program, the materials being recovered, procedures required for separation and collection, and hours of drop-off center operation. Municipalities are urged to make at least one of the two annual notifications in the form of a mailing to all residents, businesses, and institutions. Municipalities are encouraged to provide other notification to their citizens including use of radio, cable TV, newsletters, social media, websites, calendars of events, etc. Municipalities should determine that multi-family

housing units or buildings have notified their residents upon arrival and annually thereafter. Copies or records of public notifications must be available upon request by the DSWM.

i) Reporting

In order for the County to monitor the progress of the recycling program, municipalities must provide a copy of the Tonnage Grant report to the DSWM each year.

Each municipality must report to the County within 30 days any changes in provision of recycling services to generators, change in municipal recycling coordinator, change in marketing agreements for designated recyclable materials, change in provider(s) of curbside collection service or change in operation of recycling depots (e.g. hours, etc.).

j) Requiring Registration of Haulers, Scavengers or Volunteer Groups

Municipal ordinances may provide that collectors of recyclables (private haulers, private scavengers, or volunteer groups) must register and provide data on the results of their collection.

k) Single/Dual Stream Recycling

Municipalities may opt to collect their recyclables in a single stream or dual stream (fiber, commingled) provided the IPF (intermediate processing facility) that receives the material has certified that they have the ability to separate out and maximize the capture rate of the mandated recyclables.

l) Compliance with Municipal Land Use Law

Municipalities must update their ordinances to include requirements/design standards to ensure that a proper recycling system for all mandated recyclables will be provided for in developments consisting of 50 or more single family units, 25 multifamily residential housing units, and any commercial or industrial development proposal of 1,000 square feet or more of land. A recycling system must also be in place throughout the construction phase.

Note: The collection systems and marketing systems currently in place are described in Appendix V. Agreements and contracts currently in use between municipalities and providers of collection, processing, and/or marketing services are also described in Appendix V. This information will be updated annually.

6. Responsibilities of the County

a) Field Inspection/Enforcement Program

The Middlesex County Field Recycling Inspection Team will conduct a year-round inspection program to assure that multi-family, commercial, and institutional generators of solid waste and recyclables understand and comply with their responsibilities under the County Plan and State law. This generator inspection program will operate in all municipalities. Follow-up inspections will be made of generators found to be in violation of the compliance provisions of this Plan. Notices of Violation and Penalty Assessments will be issued as deemed appropriate. The inspectors will be members of the MCEHD and derive authority from the Solid Waste Management Act (N.J.S.A. 13:1E-1 et. seq.) via the County Environmental Health Act. (N.J.S.A. 26:3A2-21 et. seq.) The penalty schedule for recycling violations will be between \$100 and \$5,000.

b) Solid Waste Facility Inspection Program

Inspectors from the MCEHD and the MCUA will conduct inspections for recyclables on a year-round basis at the Middlesex County Landfill (MCLF) and in County transfer stations. The purpose of this inspection program is to assure that no recyclables are disposed at the County's disposal sites. The inspectors will perform a thorough inspection of any load that is observed to contain readily visible amounts of designated recyclable materials. Spreading and covering of the load will be delayed at the Landfill while the inspection is conducted. If the inspection discloses a violation a Notice of Violation will be issued according to the provisions of this Plan.

Solid waste and recyclables haulers, municipal or private, are responsible for what they collect. They will be subject to inspections at transfer stations, landfills, and recycling facilities. If violations are disclosed enforcement action will be taken and penalties will be issued as provided in Appendix VI.

Since haulers are responsible for what they transport to the solid waste facilities, Notices of Violation will be issued to the hauler. Penalties are assessed progressively based on the haulers' record of past violations and demonstrated results in working with generators to eliminate recyclables from the waste stream. The Department will attempt to identify the generator of the recyclables. Where generators can be identified, the Recycling Generator Inspection Program will follow up with an inspection at the generator. Follow up inspections will be conducted and penalties will be issued if necessary to assure compliance.

c) Facility Inspections

The MCEHD will continue to inspect recycling facilities, compost facilities, transfer stations, and any other solid waste facilities located in Middlesex County. These facilities are inspected to ensure their compliance with both the Middlesex County Solid Waste Management Plan and New Jersey statutes and regulations.

d) Data on Waste Disposed

The County will obtain yearly reports from the DEP, showing amounts disposed by each municipality by waste type so that recycling rates can be calculated against accurate data.

e) Notifications

The County will notify all County institutions and offices (via website, email, or other means) at least once a year of the applicable recycling requirements. DSWM will maintain a record of these notifications.

f) Assistance to a Municipality Failing to Reach the Required Recycling Rate - Assurance of Markets

The County will continually take steps to assure that all generators of designated recyclable materials are provided with recycling services (municipally provided or contracted curbside collection and/or recycling center). Presently, every municipality has a market for its collected recyclables.

If, at a future date, a deficiency of service shall be identified and shall continue for more than six months, the County will solicit proposals from, review qualifications of, and enter into contracts or agreements on behalf of municipalities with persons providing recycling services or operating recycling centers for the collection, storage, processing, and disposition of designated recyclable materials.

- g) Assistance to Municipalities Failing to Reach the Required Recycling Rate - Administrative Assistance
- DSWM and County Administrator will consult with the Mayor, Recycling Coordinator, and Public Works Official on improvements to the local recycling program.
 - A DSWM staff member will be assigned to work with local officials until the deficiency is eliminated.
 - County Commissioners will consult with local elected officials.
 - The focus of the County's Public Information Program will be adjusted to assist the municipality.

h) Market Information

The County will continue to make available current information on markets, prices, and providers of services as requested. The County will also be prepared to provide information on equipment and collection systems.

i) Educational Materials

The County will make available educational, informational, and motivational materials from various sources - commercial and governmental. The County Solid Waste Management staff will also be available as a "speaker's bureau" for schools, service clubs, Chambers of Commerce, etc.

j) Bicycle Collection Program

The County had our first bicycle collection in conjunction with Pedals for Progress on June 18, 2005. 83 bikes were collected. A second collection was held on June 3, 2006 and 55 bikes were collected. The DSWM plans to support these events in the future.

k) Paper Shred Program

A Paper Shred Program was started in 2005. A mobile paper shredding truck is contracted to visit various locations and shreds paper onsite. This program allows residents to recycle their old documents and confidential files safely and securely. Through the end of 2019, 248 events have been held. Collectively, 65,816 residents delivered 3,260,867 pounds/1630 tons of paper for recycling to these events.

l) Improved Recycling Tonnage Information

The DSWM has taken an active role in gathering tonnage information by contacting markets, recycling facilities, and haulers in and outside Middlesex County. The DSWM also trains and assists municipal coordinators in the proper completion of the required tonnage grant files.

7. Priority Consideration

The Recycling Act calls for priority consideration for certain persons (or businesses) that were engaged in recycling activities before the Recycling Act was adopted. Persons previously engaged in recycling as defined in this provision of the Recycling Act shall receive priority in case of equal bids or equal qualifications in competitive selection situations.

8. MCIA Curbside Collection Program

The MCIA has contracted with a private contractor for a minimum of biweekly residential curbside recycling collection service for municipalities that choose to participate in their program. One private contractor is currently responsible for the collection of recyclables in the 16 municipalities who opted to become full participants in the MCIA's curbside collection program. The remaining 9 towns have chosen to continue to provide recycling services on their own.

The materials collected initially include, at a minimum, the following materials:

- Glass food and beverage containers
- Aluminum cans
- Steel food and beverage containers
- Plastic containers
- Newspaper
- Corrugated cardboard
- Mixed paper

The materials are currently collected single stream and residents are provided with curbside containers.

The MCIA collection program may in the future provide for collection of other items as markets become available. Collection is from all residential units, including multi-family complexes. Small businesses which generate a low volume of recyclables and are currently serviced by municipal pick up continue to be serviced under this plan. Large businesses and commercial and industrial complexes continue to be serviced as they currently are, the vast majority of which are by private contractors.

Middlesex County permits those municipalities which choose to retain all or a portion of their present recycling practices to do so, provided that they comply with both present and future requirements of the County Recycling Plan. Said municipalities will still be required to: meet the minimum standards of the County Recycling Plan in terms of the materials to be collected; ensure that all recyclables collected are Intermediate Processing Facility compatible and processable; and to ensure that types and quantities of recyclables are properly documented. Municipalities opting not to participate in the MCIA Curbside Collection Program must submit to the County, for review, their municipal recycling plan to ensure that it meets all necessary requirements of the County Recycling Plan. After County review, the municipality will have ninety (90) days, unless extended for just cause by the MCIA, to correct any inconsistencies and to bring its plan into complete compliance with the County's program requirements.

Funding:

A portion of the MCIA Curbside Collection Program was originally funded through the Resource Recovery Investment Tax Funds. Participating municipalities shared the cost with the MCIA for recycling collection services. Due to the economies of scale, the MCIA has been able to provide recycling collection service through a Master Contract at less cost than most of the existing costs appropriated in the municipal budgets.

The primary goal of the MCIA sponsored collection through a private hauler is to realize cost savings through uniformity in collection, processing, and marketing and related program efficiencies.

The municipalities have the following options under a Master Contract for the collection, processing, and marketing of recyclable materials:

Full Participation: A private contractor retained by the MCIA assumes the collection, processing, and marketing of all recyclables for municipalities not desiring to keep their own municipal collection program. A credit percentage of a minimum of 25 percent of the MCIA's contract amount may be

applied to reduce the costs to the municipality, exclusive of unique or special services as requested by said municipality. A credit is not presently being offered and the municipality must pay the full cost of the contract.

Grant Participation: Those municipalities electing to continue collecting, processing, and marketing the recyclables themselves are required to meet the minimum specifications of the County Recycling Plan. For Grant Participating Municipalities, the MCIA developed a formula for financial encouragement grants which were made available to municipalities wishing to continue with locally implemented recycling programs. The formula considered program costs, efficiency, and program compliance, and grants were based thereon. In no case will reimbursement be made to any municipality in excess of the credit percentage made for Full Participants of the costs incurred for MCIA implemented programs. Grants were available for a period of five years, terminating on December 31, 1999. Via Administrative Action 008-99, grants for additional years were proposed to be provided while funding was still available. The grants were ended in 2021.

The map on the following page shows which municipalities as of September 2022 are currently full participants in the MCIA curbside program (formerly known as A-Towns) and which are nonparticipants/independent (formerly known as C-Towns).

Marketing:

Under the MCIA-sponsored curbside collection program, the private contractor is assigned the task of marketing the recyclables. All existing marketing contracts were maintained through to their termination date. The contracts may be renegotiated through the MCIA as a contracting party to secure more long-term contracts. The contracts will specify quality standards for the program to meet as well as revenue sharing formula. In addition, the MCIA will promote in-county markets for recycled products through its own and other agencies' purchasing power.

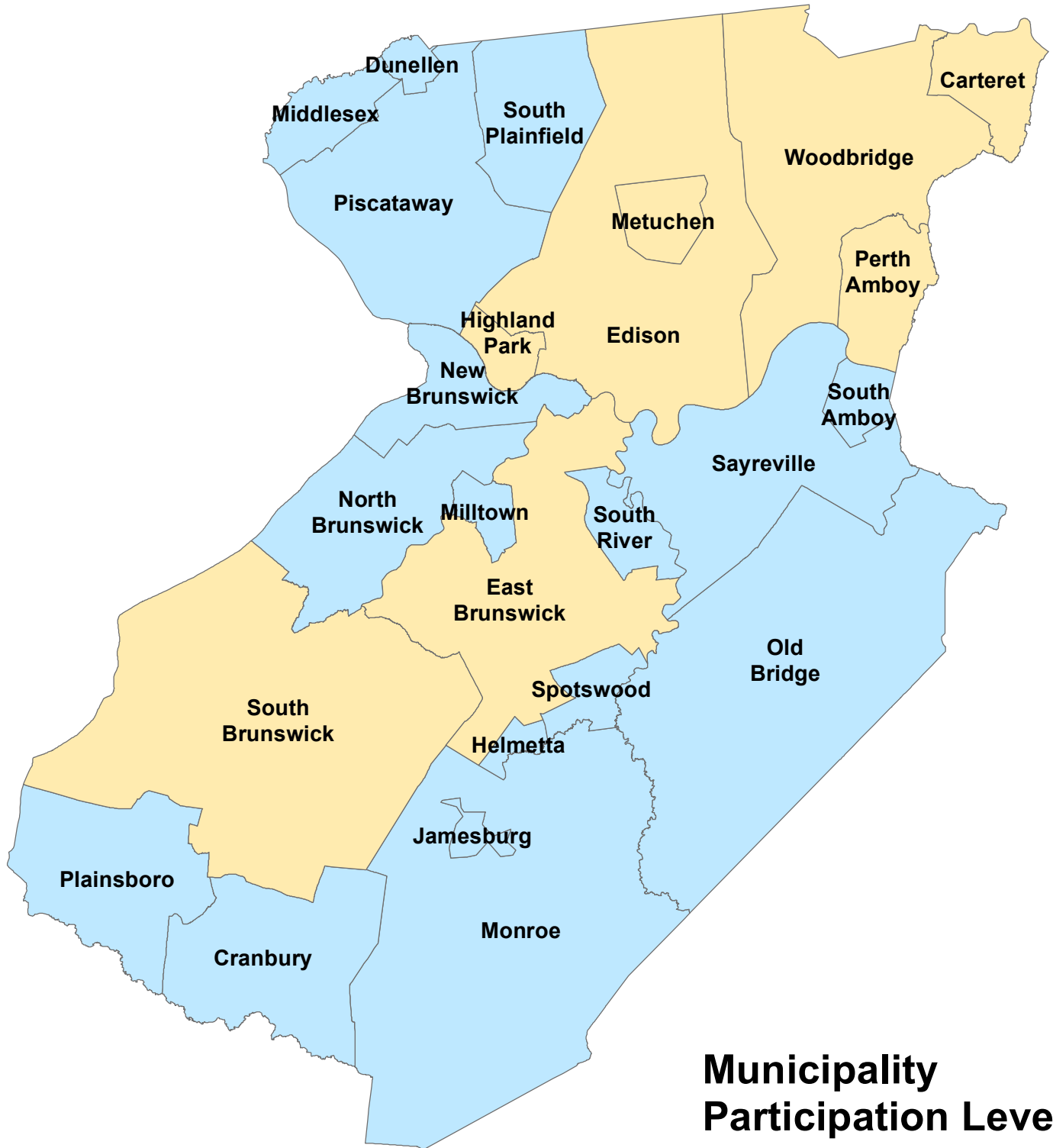
Materials Recovery Facility (MRF):

The Plan calls for the utilization of private MRF capacity to process commingled recyclables to market specifications which yield the greatest economic advantage to the County. The MCIA may implement development of a MRF, if in the opinion of the Board of County Commissioners, after receiving input from SWAC, the private sector is unable to process the County's commingled materials to a satisfactory market specification in a cost-effective manner based upon lowest annual operating cost for the participating municipalities.



Public Awareness/Education Programs:

The MCIA has a number of methods for educating the residents about recycling and the curbside recycling program. The schedules are posted on the MCIA website and are provided in electronic form to the participating municipalities. They have a recycled robot, MCGreen, which is available for booking. The MCIA has also provided flyers and informational materials to the towns.

9. Composting

Yard Waste Program

As of October 1995, the MCIA manages the yard waste program for the County. Under Plan Amendment 1994-4, the MCIA may hire a private contractor to manage and operate existing sites or the MCIA may elect to operate the sites themselves if it determines it to be the most cost-effective option. Municipalities retain responsibility for the collection and transportation of both leaves and brush to said sites.

Services under this program are currently supplied by the MCIA contracted vendor. The current contractor is Natures Choice and this contract runs through 2024, with the option for 2 1-year extensions. Participating municipalities pay the entire contracted costs for the services.

The Sayreville and Kilmer Compost Sites, for which the MCIA hired a contractor to operate, and which operated in the 1990s and early 2000s, are now closed. The Quarry Lane Compost site, formerly operated by the Middlesex County Parks Department under an arrangement with the MCIA, has also closed. The MCIA's contractor operates a transfer facility for yard waste adjacent to the Middlesex County Landfill. The East Brunswick Compost site, under contract to the MCIA, continues to accept leaves and brush. Some of the municipalities also have leaf and brush transfer operations at their yards. Those leaves and brush are picked up by the MCIA's contractor.

A pilot grass program was also established in 1995. Under this program, municipalities may choose to request roll-off containers for grass. The containers are located at a municipal facility or the town may opt to deliver the grass to a regional site. These containers are pulled by a contractor at cost to the town, and the grass is sent out of County for composting.

The Municipal Program Summary in Appendix V details where each municipality was designated to bring their leaves and brush and whether they participate in the pilot grass program.

10. Compliance By Generators

This section describes the required actions to be taken by generators of recyclables to ensure Middlesex County will meet and exceed the 50 percent and 60 percent recycling goal imposed by State Law.

a) Residential Compliance Requirements (single family and up to four-family houses).

Citizens are responsible for source separating mandated items according to municipal ordinances and consistent with the Middlesex County Solid Waste Management Plan and delivering them to the municipal collection system (whether curbside collection or drop-off center). These items must be source separated; no mandated recyclables are permitted in the garbage put out for collection; no garbage is permitted in recyclables placed in the municipality's collection system.

b) Multi-family Compliance Requirements (condominiums, townhouses, low and high-rise apartments).

1. The owner/management is responsible for ensuring that a recycling system is established and that it is operated in compliance with the requirements of the municipal ordinance and this Plan. The owner/management is responsible for setting up and maintaining the recycling system. The owner/management is responsible for receiving and responding to Warnings, Notices of Violation, and Penalty Assessments and for correcting violations. The

owner/management will be expected to correct violations promptly and to make necessary direct contacts with residents.

2. Drop-off centers must be established and maintained so that they are conveniently accessible to residents. Curbside collection may be made available in place of, or in conjunction with, these drop-off centers. The recycling system must provide for all mandated recyclables in the residential waste stream. The recycling system may utilize separate containers for each recyclable material or it may provide for two or more materials to be placed in one container provided the recycling hauler can take the materials commingled. Containers must be clearly marked and the area neatly maintained. Container capacity must be adequate to hold the amount of materials generated between pick-ups. It must be clear to an inspector that the system is being serviced.

3. It must be clear that the system is being used properly by employees and tenants. There must not be garbage in the recycling containers or recyclables in the garbage containers. The owner/management is responsible for resolving problems which may arise from the improper use of containers and for training employees and tenants to properly understand and use the recycling system.

4. Notification and collection rules shall be issued by the management to new tenants when they arrive and to all residents every three months. Copies of these notices, or other proof of distribution of the notices, must be sent to the municipal recycling coordinator at the time of each mailing or distribution.

5. The owner/management is responsible for arranging to have recyclables picked up and for resolving any problems with the transporter of recyclables.

6. The owner/management must arrange to obtain documentation in order to report the tonnages of materials recycled at least once per year (or as specified by the municipality) or else he/she must arrange to have the collector provide that documentation directly to the municipality. Arrangements with recycling companies or with haulers handling recyclables should include provisions for obtaining this information. Documentation must be maintained by the management. When the municipality provides recyclables collection service, reporting and proof are not needed.

7. Single/Dual Stream Recycling: Multi-family locations may opt to collect their recyclables in a single stream or dual stream (fiber, commingled) provided the Intermediate Processing Facility (IPF) that receives the material has certified that they have the ability to separate and maximize the capture rate of the mandated recyclables.

c) Commercial and Institutional Compliance Requirements (retail, wholesale, restaurants, taverns, schools, institutions - including government, warehouses, construction sites, factories, offices, etc. but specifically excluding Fairs, Parks, Concerts, and other Outdoor Events – see Section d).

1. The owner/operator (or in case of construction, the contractor), is responsible for ensuring that a recycling system is established and that it is operated in compliance with the requirements of the municipal ordinance and this Plan. The owner/operator/contractor is responsible for setting up and maintaining the recycling system. The owner/operator/contractor is responsible for receiving and responding to Warnings, Notices of Violation, and Penalty Assessments and for correcting violations promptly.

2. The recycling system must be established and maintained so that it is conveniently accessible to users. The recycling system must provide for all mandated recyclables in the commercial waste stream. The recycling system may utilize separate containers for each recyclable material or it may provide for two or more materials to be placed in one container provided the recycling hauler can take the materials commingled. Containers must be clearly marked and the

- area neatly maintained. Container capacity must be adequate to hold the amount of materials generated between pick-ups. It must be clear to the inspector that the system is being serviced.
3. The owner/operator/contractor must ensure that the system is being used properly by employees, customers, or tenants. There must not be garbage in the recycling containers or recyclables in the garbage containers. The owner/operator/contractor is responsible for resolving problems which may arise from the improper use of containers and for instructing employees, tenants, and customers to understand and use the recycling system.
 4. If patrons, customers, or employees are involved in the waste disposal process (i.e. fast-food stores or company cafeteria), the recycling system must allow for this and include notice to customers as to their responsibilities.
 5. The owner/operator/contractor is responsible for arranging for recyclables to be removed from the premises and for assuring that they go into the recyclables market. The owner/operator/contractor may make arrangements to deliver the recyclables to the municipal collection system (drop-off center or curbside collection) if permitted by the municipality. Otherwise, the owner/operator/contractor is responsible for arranging to have recyclables picked up and for resolving any problems with the transporter of recyclables.
 6. The owner/operator/contractor must arrange to obtain documentation in order to report the tonnages of materials recycled at least once per year (or as specified by the municipality) or else he/she must arrange to have the collector provide that documentation directly to the municipality.
 7. Single/Dual Stream Recycling: Commercial and Institutional establishments may opt to collect their recyclables in a single stream or dual stream (fiber, commingled) provided the IPF that receives the material has certified that they have the ability to separate out and maximize the capture rate of the mandated recyclables.
 8. Recycling Containers: Commercial and Institutional establishments that have outdoor garbage containers for their customers must also have outdoor recycling containers. There must be sufficient recycling containers for any mandated recyclables in the commercial/institutional waste stream.
 9. All schools must provide written notice at the beginning of each school year, to all students, teachers, and other staff on the recycling requirements. The notice must contain a contact number to call if they observe any problems associated with recycling or if recycling is not properly occurring.

d) Requirements for Fairs, Parks, Concerts, Streets, and other Outdoor Events.

1. The organizer/owner/contactor of the location must provide a recycling system that is operated in compliance with the requirements of the municipal ordinance and this Plan.
2. The recycling system must provide for any mandated recyclables generated at the event. It must be clear to an inspector that the system is being serviced: i.e., containers must be clearly marked and the area neatly maintained; there must not be garbage in the recyclables or recyclables in the garbage; container capacity must be adequate to hold materials between pick-ups. There must be sufficient recycling containers for any mandated recyclables generated at the event.
3. The organizer/owner/contactor is responsible for arranging for recyclables to be removed from the premises and for ensuring that they are taken to an approved recyclables market. The owner/operator/contractor may make arrangements to deliver the recyclables to the municipal collection system (drop-off center or curbside collection) if permitted by the municipality. Otherwise, the owner/operator/contractor is responsible for arranging to have recyclables

collected and transported and for resolving any problems with the transporter of the recyclables.

4. The recycling system must be made accessible and available to all patrons, customers, and employees. Notice/signs must be provided to ensure all are aware of their responsibilities.
5. The owner/operator/contractor is responsible for obtaining pertinent documentation in order to report the tonnages of materials recycled at least once per year (or as specified by the municipality) or else he/she must arrange to have the collector provide that documentation directly to the municipality.
6. Single/Dual Stream Recycling: The recycling system may utilize separate containers for each recyclable material or it may provide for two or more materials to be placed in one container. Establishments may opt to collect their recyclables in a single stream or dual stream (fiber, commingled) provided the IPF that receives the material has certified that they have the ability to separate out and maximize the capture rate of the mandated recyclables.

11. Exemptions

a) Section 6d of the Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act (N.J.S.A. 13:1E-99.16d) provides for exemption from the source separation requirements in the case of commercial and institutional generators of recyclables that can demonstrate that other arrangements have been made for the separation and marketing of recyclables. The requirements for claiming this exemption are as follows:

On March 31, 2008, all existing exemptions shall be revoked and must be reapplied for consistent with the following guidelines.

- The mixed waste and recyclables taken from an eligible location may only be taken to a licensed "Transfer Station/MRF". That facility must have the ability to separate out for recycling all mandated recyclables that were commingled with the garbage.
- Exemptions are valid for a period of up to three years which will begin on the date of issuance and expire on March 31st of the third year.
- No exemption renewal will be issued if the recycling tonnage report is not received by March 1st of each year.
- The generator must apply in writing for the exemption and receive an official written notice that it has been granted from that municipal official(s) authorized by the ordinance to grant exemptions.

The exemption request must be accompanied by the following information:

- A letter from the specified hauler agreeing to have the mandated materials separated, which must specifically list the materials that will be separated.
- A letter from the specified receiving facility including the valid NJDEP permit number that states the mandated materials will be separated.
- An explanation of why their particular operation, circumstance or facility makes adhering to the source separation requirements of the recycling plan impractical.
- A description of the nature of the business and the estimated monthly and yearly tonnages of solid waste and designated recyclables to be generated by their facility. The generator must demonstrate that they have at least 75 percent mandated recyclables in their waste stream to qualify for the exemption.
- A list of mandated materials that the materials recovery facility will be recycling for their business.
- A description of how the generator disposed of their solid waste pursuant to Middlesex County's waste flow strategy (Plan Amendment 1997-3) and handled recyclables up to the date of the application.

- A listing of any violations cited (and disposition thereof) for the generator with respect to the solid waste or recyclables generated from their facility.
 - The application shall be certified under oath so that in the event there is a deliberate misstatement, the applicant will be subject to enforcement action.
- If during the term of the exemption, the generator switches haulers, or the hauler switches the receiving facility, the existing exemption is no longer valid and must be reapplied for.
 - If the generator is granted the exemption, the company is required to include signage in a prominent place that states that recyclable material is being sorted out at a materials recovery facility.
 - The generator must be able to show the exemption approval and a copy of his/her waste removal contract when the exemption is claimed to the MCEHD recycling inspector.
 - Any exemptions granted by the municipality will have to be material specific, list the hauler name, and identify by street address the exact location of the business that has been granted the exemption. Businesses with more than one location must apply for exemptions for each location separately. A copy of each exemption granted must be submitted by the municipality to the DSWM.

In addition, municipalities may choose not to include the exemption provision in their updated recycling ordinance, amend their updated ordinance that provides for exemptions to eliminate the exemption provision if they are not satisfied that all requirements of the exemption(s) are being met, or may, if their updated recycling ordinance provides for exemptions, revoke an individual exemption for non-compliance at any time. Also, municipalities may wish to consider charging a fee to process the application for an exemption.

b) The following provisions apply to all:

1. Exemptions pertain to commercial and institutional (medical, educational, government) establishments only, not residential premises. Residential premises include single-family homes, garden and high-rise apartments, condos, townhouses, and other multi-family units.
2. Properly licensed haulers utilizing a properly licensed Transfer Station/MRF who service commercial and institutional generators may not collect commingled garbage and recyclables without the generator having first obtained a duly authorized exemption from their respective municipality. Haulers servicing non-exempted generators (including residential/multi-family locations which are not allowed exemptions) shall not collect and mix in one vehicle the generator's garbage and source separated recyclables. Those haulers found to be mixing a non-exempted generator's garbage and recyclables will be in violation of the County Plan and subject to enforcement action and the imposition of penalties issued by the MCEHD as specified in Appendix VI.

D. Waste Management Agreements

Middlesex County has no agreements to accept waste from other counties or send waste to facilities in other counties. The County has no agreements or contracts to provide for Middlesex waste being disposed of in out-of-county facilities or out-of-state facilities. Middlesex County has no contracts with commercial haulers except for removal of waste and recyclables from County facilities.

Commercial contracts for waste removal or recyclables collection have been entered into by various municipalities. Information is provided in the Municipal Program Summary in Appendix V.

In addition, the MCIA has entered into a five-year contract with Central Jersey Waste/Solterra for the collection of recyclables in the municipalities fully participating in the MCIA's curbside recycling program. The contract expires on March 30, 2025. The MCIA has also entered into an agreement with Nature's Choice for yard waste management services. This contract expires in August, 2024.

E. Plan Inclusion/Plan Amendments For New Solid Waste And Recycling Facilities

In the case of solid waste and recycling facilities, County Plan inclusion must be obtained before a DEP permit will be issued.

Appendix III provides the Solid Waste Advisory Council (SWAC) "Application Filing Requirements" for review of recycling and solid waste facilities. The Application Filing Requirements are reviewed and updated periodically by a SWAC subcommittee. The DSWM will make copies of the County requirements available upon request.

The DSWM no longer has specific public notice requirements for Plan Inclusion, however all applicants seeking Plan inclusion must publish any notices required as per N.J.A.C. 7:26, N.J.A.C. 7:26A and/or N.J.A.C. 7:1C et seq.

All solid waste facilities, as well as intermodal facilities included in the County Plan must:

1. Commit to providing the DSWM with tonnage data on a yearly basis by March 1st for the previous year as follows:
 - Tons of incoming material received at the facility, by source municipality and type of waste
 - Tons of any recyclables recovered at the facility by source municipality and the end market for those recyclables (if sent to another facility)
 - Tons of outgoing material.
2. Commit to providing New Jersey municipalities with tonnage data on a yearly basis by March 1st as follows:
 - Tons of any recyclables recovered at the facility by source municipality and the end market for those recyclables (if sent to another facility)
3. Commit to providing the County monthly, by the 20th of the following month, the solid waste records for all Middlesex County generated waste disposed/transferred at the facility including all information required by N.J.A.C. 7:26-2.13(a) summarized by hauler.

All recycling facilities, as well as RD&D facilities included in the County Plan must:

1. Commit to providing to each source municipality in New Jersey, tons of material received by the facility minus processing residuals by source municipality on a yearly basis by March 1st for the previous year. Describe how data is derived and if the recyclables are sent to another recycling facility for further processing, provide the name of that facility.
2. Commit to providing the County of Middlesex with the following information on yearly basis by March 1st for the previous year:
 - Tons of incoming materials received by the facility by source municipality.
 - Tons of each recyclable material sent to markets, allocated by source municipality.
 - Documentation of tons of nonrecyclable materials/residue.

The procedure for obtaining County approval for Plan inclusion of solid waste and Class B, certain Class C (non-vegetative), and Class D recycling facilities in the County Plan follows the major Plan Amendment procedures as outlined in Chapter 1, Section B.

Class A, Class C vegetative composting (including leaves, grass, and brush), leaf composting operations facilities, intermodal container, and RD&D facilities will be included in the Plan via the Administrative Action procedure subject to the following conditions:

- If any substantive objections to the site location are raised by the host municipality, the DSWM, or any other person, the facility shall be subject to the formal Plan Amendment process. Substantive objections would not include any issues concerning compliance with local zoning and planning ordinances. The decision to require the Plan Amendment process shall be made by the DSWM (after consulting with the Solid Waste Advisory Council).
- All Administrative Actions for inclusion for new recycling facilities will be approved or rejected by the Middlesex County Board of County Commissioners by duly adopted resolution. The resolution approving, or disapproving the Administrative Action will be submitted to the NJ DEP by the DSWM.
- Administrative Actions for inclusion of intermodal container or RD&D facilities do not require a Middlesex County Board of County Commissioners resolution and instead follow the traditional Administrative Action procedure.

The below requirements and procedures are being proposed solely for those facilities looking to operate under 7:26A-1.4(a)13.

Facility operators shall submit to the Division of Solid Waste Management (DSWM) and the host municipality's Municipal Clerk:

1. The NJDEP Notification of Exempt Recycling Activities form.
2. A commitment to provide to each source municipality in New Jersey and Middlesex County, tons of material received by the facility minus processing residuals by source municipality on a yearly basis by February 1st for the previous year.
3. A site plan which shows at a minimum, processed and unprocessed piles/windrows, buffer areas, access roads, and water supply. There is no requirement for an engineer/surveyor signed site plan.

All applicants shall make one or more presentations to SWAC and be prepared to respond to any pertinent questions raised by SWAC on the proposed facility.

Facility operators, by virtue of signing the Notification of Exempt Recycling Activities form, are committing to operating under the NJDEP regulations that govern this exemption. This includes compliance with all municipal regulations and ordinances. Inclusion in the County Solid Waste Management Plan for this type of exemption does not negate those responsibilities.

The DSWM will notify the Municipal Planning Board, Engineer's Office, Health Official, Fire Chief, and Recycling Coordinator that the application package has been filed and is available at the Municipal Clerk's Office. If the property is not owned by the facility operator, the property owner must be provided with a copy of the application package and the property owner's name and contact information must be provided to the DSWM as part of the application package.

F. Coordination and Provision of New Facilities

The DSWM provides coordination among municipal, county and state organizations with respect to this Plan. This is done for new facility proposals and solid waste or recycling initiatives. In particular, the DSWM asks for municipal comments before acting to include a new solid waste or recycling facility in the Plan. The DSWM provides staff support to the County SWAC and provides minutes for its meetings.

The DSWM works closely with the MCEHD which derives authority from the County Environmental Health Act to regulate solid waste facilities. Reports of illegal activity are immediately relayed to the MCEHD. Very close cooperation is maintained with respect to the team of MCEHD inspectors assigned to enforcing the County's recycling program.

The DSWM works cooperatively with the MCUA and MCIA on matters relating to solid waste management and recycling.

G. Planning - Financing

1. Resource Recovery Investment Tax Spending Plan

The Resource Recovery Investment Tax (RRIT) was approved by the legislature and the governor in 1984. It was one of a package of taxes imposed at New Jersey disposal sites to raise funds for recycling, general solid waste management projects, and in the case of RRIT, to begin immediately to develop a fund that would cushion the "rate shock" expected to result from building waste to energy (resource recovery) facilities. After 1990, when waste to energy facilities lost favor, RRIT funds began to be utilized to fund County-wide recycling programs.

In February, 1987, the Board of Chosen Freeholders approved a Plan Amendment (1987-1) providing for use of the funds to build a recycling sorting center and to reduce the costs of constructing the resource recovery plant. The DEP Commissioner approved the drawdown plan on January 14, 1988. Only \$450,000 of the money approved in the drawdown plan was expended and those funds were spent on costs related to the Resource Recovery project.

In early 1992, via Plan Amendment 1992-5, \$300,000 of the RRIT funds were appropriated for the hiring of an engineering/consulting firm to assist the County in formulating a comprehensive long term County managed recycling system.

In 1992, Plan Amendment 1992-7 was adopted which provided a \$3,055,000 drawdown of the RRIT fund via the Municipal Recycling Assistance Program Grants. The objective of the program was to assist each municipality in the conduct of its local recycling program and to provide a financial incentive for each community to expand its recycling efforts. These grants were distributed to every municipality following approval of the municipality's grant application. Funds were distributed as follows:

Each municipality received a base amount of \$30,000. The remaining funds were disbursed according to the following percentages:

- 40 percent of the appropriation was based on population
- 50 percent of the appropriation was based on recycling tonnage collected according to the 1991 Bonus Grant Form
- 10 percent of the appropriation was based on the land area of the municipality.

The municipalities were permitted to utilize the funds only for their recycling programs, including costs related to personnel, collection, equipment, marketing, education, and enforcement. Municipalities were given approximately one year to spend their grants.

The program was repeated in 1994 via Plan Amendment 1994-1. The disbursements and program requirements were identical to those in the earlier Amendment.

Also in 1994, via Plan Amendment 1994-3, a disbursement schedule was set and approved by NJ DEP for the remaining RRIT funds. The disbursement was for the County managed long term recycling system. The funds would be used to reduce the costs of recycling to fully participating municipalities by credits of a minimum of 50 percent of those costs of the MCIA curbside collection program. Grant-participating municipalities would receive grants of a lesser percentage than that credit being awarded to fully participating municipalities.

Five million dollars was allocated for the collection subsidies to municipalities. Funds were also allocated for the following areas:

1. Consulting/Project Management - for recycling projects needing a professional engineering firm
2. Interim Yard Waste - for the hiring of a company to manage various compost facilities around the County
3. Grass - for the pilot project of siting containers at municipal public works yards for the collection and recycling of grass
4. Administration - for various administrative costs related to the program
5. Education - for a campaign to educate the residents about the various portions of the recycling program
6. Contingencies - any unexpected costs related to the program

In early 1997, Administrative Action 002-97 was approved by the County which allocated RRIT monies for the Paint Recycling Collection Program. This Action allocated an amount not to exceed \$175,000.00 per year for 1997-1999 for the following costs:

Manpower reimbursement (for municipalities)	\$9,600.00
Equipment (shed/container)	\$8,000.00
Contractor/Vendor	\$121,845.00
Education/Advertising	\$20,000.00
Contingencies	\$15,555.00

In 2000, Administrative Action 008-99 was adopted, which includes an associated spending schedule and covers the distribution of the remaining RRIT funds being held by the County. It proposed

that up to 50 percent of the cost associated with the County’s recycling collection and yard waste programs be withdrawn on an annual basis until such time that the RRIT funds are depleted.

Those funds have all been expended.

2. Finance Plans for Major County Facilities

NJ DEP regulations require a formal plan of finance for each facility be presented to the public, reviewed at a public hearing, and be submitted as a Plan Amendment. In the spring of 1989, a plan was prepared for the costs of acquiring land and building a new state of the art landfill at the Edgeboro site (Amendment 1989-10). This Plan Amendment was approved by the NJ DEP and in summary is as follows:

Funding for the capital requirements of the Middlesex County Landfill will come from 1 or more of the following 5 sources:

- 1. tax exempt bond proceeds
- 2. taxable bond proceeds (if required)
- 3. equity contribution by MCUA (reserve funds)
- 4. RRIT funds (currently devoted to the recycling program)
- 5. interest earnings on unexpended proceeds

3. Other Funding

The DSWM has received in the past and continues to receive other grant and fee monies that fund special programs.

The Recycling Tax grant, which sunset in 1996, was used to fund special recycling programs such as the tire recycling program, assembly programs for schools, the household battery program, and the County’s office paper pick-up program. The Solid Waste Services Tax (SWST) fund (approximately \$300,000 per year) was generally utilized for funding the Household Hazardous Waste Events and maintenance of the compost machines. The SWST grants ended in 2008. It was replaced by the Recycling Enhancement Act grant which funds the programs previously funded by the SWST. The Clean Communities Grant (approximately \$50,000 per year) is used for cleanup activities and education. The previous four grants are/were received from the NJ DEP. The Solid Waste Management Service Fees (approximately \$250,000 per year for the DSWM) is also used to fund programs previously funded by the Recycling Tax grant.

4. Recycling Enhancement Grant (REG):

This program, which began in 2004, was a competitive program whereby municipalities submitted grant applications for various recycling projects. Municipalities were required to match a portion of the grant. Each year, a “theme” was chosen to focus on certain areas that the DSWM felt would benefit the County’s overall recycling efforts. In past years, the themes have included improving municipal drop-offs, educating the public about recycling, and school recycling. Six grants were awarded in 2004, five in 2005, eight in 2006, nine in 2007, and eight in 2008. The DSWM restarted the program in 2018. A summary of the grants is provided below.

H. Use of Terminated Disposal Facilities

The Solid Waste Management Act requires the County to indicate the future utilization of closed landfill sites.

The DSWM recommends that all entities classify closed landfills as “open space” until it can be adequately determined that the site is suitable for other classification. It is also recommended that the Land Use Plans establish a special land use and zoning classification for terminated landfills and adjacent affected areas if any. The provisions of this classification should assure that the purchase or ownership transfer of terminated landfills or affected nearby lands, if any, be accompanied by adequate notice of previous use, use restrictions, etc. Careful investigation of the requirements of the

proposed use as related to the details of the previous use as a landfill should be incorporated into any application for a construction permit or site plan approval.

I. County Planning - Public Information, and Education

Middlesex County operates a broad scale public information program in cooperation with its 25 municipalities and expects to continue and to expand the program described below.

The Solid Waste Advisory Council (SWAC) meets almost every month each year. Membership consists of citizen, business, industrial, waste industry, environmental, and municipal representatives. Each mayor is a member during his/her term of office and may designate an alternate attendee. Minutes are routinely prepared and emailed to all SWAC members. Minutes and meeting agendas are also posted on the County website.

Approximately \$20,000.00 per year is budgeted in connection with advertisements pertaining to the Household Hazardous Waste and paper shred collection events, tire collections, and other special events. Legal notices are published in connection with each Plan Amendment public hearing.

The DSWM provides written information to Mayors and Councils of all municipalities on major new programs and on updates and results of ongoing programs.

The County regularly hires educational assembly program performers to provide shows to elementary schools throughout the County.

The Recycling Field Inspection Program has been designed and operated primarily as a public education program for businesses and multi-family residences. Emphasis has been on information and persuasion rather than on enforcement. The MCEHD operates this program.

The Rutgers Cooperative Extension of Middlesex County assists in educating citizens about backyard composting, the grass cut-it-and-leave-it program, and the use of compost.

The DSWM staff makes itself available as a speaker's bureau.

The DSWM continues to provide recycling containers to schools to assist with their internal recycling programs. These containers are intended to 'seed' the school and school districts are expected to purchase the necessary bins to ensure their system is adequate to meet the needs of the students and staff.

Recycling stickers and other recycling promotional materials are distributed on request to a wide variety of organizations.

DSWM staff attends municipal fairs and other public events.

The DSWM has increased the advertising budget over the last few years to educate the residents about the recycling right and reduce, reuse, recycle campaigns. This education has been done through paid social media, an enhanced website, billboards, direct mail, radio ads, and a monthly email reminder.

J. Future Directions for the County in Waste Management

1. Establish a DSWM convenience center drop-off to expand current drop-off opportunities for residents, make programs more convenient, and to host pilot programs. The site could accept:
 - consumer electronics
 - bottles, cans, paper, and cardboard
 - paint and paint related items
 - expanded polystyrene
 - shredded paper
 - carpet
 - propane tanks
 - tires
 - HHW (for temporary, secured holding)
 - used motor oil
 - antifreeze
 - car batteries
 - rechargeable batteries
 - fluorescent bulbs
 - “reuse station” where residents can drop off and/or exchange usable items
2. Develop a specific SWMP plan for organics, focusing on food waste. Plan components may include:
 - Inventory of food system county-wide including food banks, food donors, and composting networks
 - Inventory of existing and support for expanding community gardens
 - Development of a comprehensive strategy to reduce organic waste and increase food waste recycling and composting with targets
 - Sector Based Outreach/Education Campaign which will include expanded education programs to further advocate backyard composting of appropriate food and other organics
 - Expanded food recovery, gardening, and composting programs in K – 12 and higher education schools
 - Identification of barriers to organic waste recycling in the County
 - Assessment of the feasibility of using County-owned property for organic waste recycling facilities.
 - Assessment of incentives to attract businesses using innovative technologies to handle food waste
3. Pay as you throw pilot with a volunteer municipality to assess whether a PAYT systems would reduce the amount of waste going to the Landfill
4. Multifamily targeted education
 - Multifamily complexes have many challenges with their recycling efforts and implementing a focused educational/enforcement program will be a key tool to improve their recycling programs
5. Outreach to Planning Boards to ensure that new multifamily applications are providing sufficient space for recycling
6. Survey residents and businesses on barriers to successful recycling
7. Expand education and explore options to reduce the consumption of single use items including plastics

8. Research existing recycling avenues for plastic film and explore ways to get more of this material recycled from households
9. Prepare an informational handout with recycling market information and reporting requirements for construction sites
10. Encourage the development of recycling programs for newly emerging materials in the waste stream, including solar panels and electric vehicle batteries
11. Work with schools and organizers of major events such as: fairs, concerts, and sporting events to ensure they are providing adequate, clearly marked containers for recycling
12. Expand education and explore options to avert contaminants from entering into the recycling stream

Type 10

Municipal (household, commercial, and institutional): Waste originating in the community consisting of household waste from private residences, commercial waste which originates in wholesale, retail, or service establishments, such as restaurants, stores, markets, theatres, hotels, and warehouses, and institutional waste material originated in schools, hospitals, research institutions, and public buildings.

Type 13

Bulky Waste: Large items of waste material, such as appliances and furniture. Discarded automobiles, trucks and trailers and large vehicle parts, and tires are included under this category.

Type 13C (subcategory of Type 13)

Construction and demolition waste: Waste building material and rubble resulting from construction, remodeling, repair, and demolition operations on houses, commercial buildings, pavements and other structures. The following materials may be found in construction and demolition waste: treated and untreated wood scrap; tree parts, tree stumps, and brush; concrete, asphalt, bricks, blocks, and other masonry; plaster and wallboard; roofing materials; corrugated cardboard and miscellaneous paper; ferrous and non-ferrous metal; non-asbestos building insulation; plastic scrap; dirt; carpets and padding; glass (window and door); and other miscellaneous materials; but shall not include other solid waste types.

Type 23

Vegetative waste: Waste materials from farms, plant nurseries and greenhouses that are produced from the raising of plants. This waste includes such crop residues as plant stalks, hulls, leaves, and tree wastes processed through a wood chipper. Also included are non-crop residues such as leaves, grass clippings, tree parts, shrubbery and garden wastes.

Type 25

Animal and food processing wastes: Processing waste materials generated in canneries, slaughterhouses, packing plants or similar industries, including animal manure when intended for disposal and not reuse. Also included are dead animals. Animal manure, when intended for reuse or composting, is to be managed in accordance with the criteria and standards developed by the Department of Agriculture as set forth in N.J.S.A. 4:9-38.

Type 27

Dry industrial waste: Waste materials resulting from manufacturing, industrial, and research and development processes and operations, and which are not hazardous in accordance with the standards and procedures set forth at N.J.A.C. 7:26G. Also included are nonhazardous oil spill cleanup waste, dry nonhazardous pesticides, dry nonhazardous chemical waste, and residue from the operations of a scrap metal shredding facility.

Type 27A

Waste material consisting of asbestos or asbestos containing waste.

Type 27I

Waste material consisting of incinerator ash or ash containing waste.

MIDDLESEX COUNTY SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PLAN APPLICATION FILING REQUIREMENTS FOR RECYCLING FACILITIES

The following guidelines will be used by the Middlesex County Division of Solid Waste Management (hereinafter “DSWM”) staff and the Solid Waste Advisory Council (SWAC) for reviewing requests for County Solid Waste Management Plan (hereinafter “Plan”) inclusion of recycling centers. Plan inclusion is required for all recycling facilities pursuant to N.J.A.C. 7:26A–4.2 prior to operation and prior to issuance of a permit from the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), if required. Note: A favorable recommendation from SWAC does not guarantee County Plan inclusion or DEP approval.

Middlesex County Requirements for Plan Inclusion:

1. Applicants for inclusion in the Plan must request inclusion by hard copy or electronically (see item 13 for address). They must identify the facility location by block and lot as well as street address, describe the nature of the project and provide the information requested below. Applicants must also identify the name(s) of the legal property owner(s), including the address(es), of the land on which the recycling center is proposed.
2. The request for inclusion must be supported by information including, but not limited to:
 - a. a list of the materials including the types of any reasonably anticipated contaminants to be received, stored, processed, or transferred at the recycling facility
 - b. expected daily through-put and maximum capacity of facility, total site and building size
 - c. specify how tonnage data will be determined i.e., by weight (scale), volume, etc.
 - d. the sources of these materials both as to geographical area and previous uses
 - e. marketing prospects for the material and alternatives to maintain flow if present markets weaken or fail (include names and addresses of planned end markets – any end market information deemed confidential must be so indicated and if appropriate will then be treated as confidential by the DSWM),
 - f. the amount of residue the facility expects to generate and the disposal option for that residue
 - g. a written narrative explanation of the recycling facility operation from the receipt of recyclable materials to the point of transfer of end products,
 - h. proposed days and hours of operation
 - i. number and types of vehicles entering and leaving site, list of nearby roadways serving the site, and a description of the impact that traffic associated with the proposed facility will have on existing transportation patterns (Note the County reserves the right to ask for a formal traffic impact study when deemed necessary.)
 - j. description of existing use of site and adjoining properties and distance to nearest sensitive receptor (school, residence, etc.)
 - k. how property is zoned including list of approved uses in zone
 - l. a fire control plan and emergency procedures plan. The fire control plan must be approved by the local fire official prior to the application being submitted to the Board of County Commissioners for consideration
 - m. a listing of all equipment to be used on site

n. any other pertinent information.

Additional information may be requested during the Plan inclusion process.

3. Provide 8.5 X 11 tax map as well as site plan drawings signed and sealed by a licensed professional engineer or surveyor which include the following:
 - location of all equipment, buildings, activities, and areas related to the receipt, storage, processing, and transferring of all unprocessed and processed recyclable materials
 - traffic flow in and out of the site and the vehicle routing within the site
 - floodplain delineation
 - wetlands delineation
 - stormwater runoff
 - unprocessed and processed materials stockpiles including dimensions of the piles
 - utilities
 - buffer zones required by NJDEP
4. Considering both construction and regular operations, discuss the potential of this business to impact the surrounding environment with noise, odor, traffic, dust or other air contamination, fire hazard or visual concerns and to impact water supplies, waste disposal systems or any other aspect of the local and regional community. Discuss how each potential or unavoidable impact will be managed/abated so as to minimize negative effects on the natural environment or the community. If there are no anticipated impacts, the applicant must so indicate and also specify the reason why no impacts are expected.
5. State in the proposal that appropriate representatives of the municipality and the County including but not limited to personnel from the Health Department, Recycling Office, Police Department, Fire Department, and Engineer's office will have access to the site for inspections of operations and records.
6. List Municipal, County, State, Federal permits/approvals that may be needed for the operation, including air pollution permits, Freehold Soil approvals, planning/zoning board approvals. List the status of each.
7.
 - a. Commit to providing to each source municipality in New Jersey, tons of material received by the facility minus processing residuals by source municipality on a yearly basis by March 1st for the previous year. Describe how data is derived and if the recyclables are sent to another recycling facility for further processing, provide the name of that facility.
 - b. Commit to providing the County of Middlesex with the following information on yearly basis by March 1st for the previous year:
 - Tons of incoming materials received by the facility by source municipality.
 - Tons of each recyclable material sent to markets, allocated by source municipality.
 - Documentation of tons of nonrecyclable materials/residue.
8. All applicants shall make two or more presentations to SWAC and be prepared to respond to

any pertinent questions raised by SWAC on the proposed facility. Appropriate personnel (engineers, attorneys) familiar with the facility application are expected to be available at the presentation(s).

9. The applicant must be prepared to supply any information requested by municipal officials, boards or agencies. Concurrent with the submission of the application to the DSWM, the applicant must provide the application package to the Municipal Clerk by Certified Mail - Return Receipt Requested and must provide a copy of the signed receipt to the DSWM. The applicant must also notify the Municipal Planning Board, Police Chief, Engineer's Office, Health Official, Fire Chief, and Recycling Coordinator that the application package has been filed and is available at the Municipal Clerk's Office.

The County will also notify the above mentioned officials to ensure the host municipality has been adequately informed. The officials will also be invited to participate in the SWAC site tour and/or will be asked to submit comments regarding the proposed facility. The DSWM will keep the municipality informed of SWAC and County Commissioners action dates.

In addition, the DSWM will write to the host municipality's governing body to ask for a town or planning board resolution in support or against the proposed facility. The governing body will be informed that if SWAC does not hear from them within 60 days, SWAC will assume that the municipality is not opposed to the facility.

The County will also inform the Mayor and SWAC representative of any contiguous municipality which might reasonably be impacted by the facility that the application has been submitted and suggest that their SWAC Representative serve on the site inspection subcommittee.

These above procedures **do not** exempt the applicant from obtaining any necessary local approvals.

10. The applicant is advised that any facility which is included in the Plan for more than two years but for which a completed permit application has not been made to the DEP, or any facility which is included in the Plan but has not been in operation for more than two years is subject to deletion from the Plan.
11. Applicants seeking Plan inclusion must publish any notices required as per N.J.A.C. 7:26A and/or N.J.A.C. 7:1C et seq.

Middlesex County CEHA Recycling Generator Penalty Resolution
for Generators of Designated Recyclable Materials

WHEREAS, Middlesex County designated the Middlesex County Public Health Department (MCPHD) as the County entity for administration of the County Environmental Health Act (CEHA) Program, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 26:3A2-21 et seq. (CEHA).

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) certified approval of the County CEHA Plan for solid waste environmental enforcement, among other things, authorizing the MCPHD to enforce the Solid Waste Management Act and the rules and regulations adopted thereunder.

WHEREAS, the County has recommended adoption of a Resolution to establish penalties for violations of the Middlesex County District Solid Waste Management plan to source separate designated recyclable materials in accordance with the State's Solid Waste Management Act, and the rules and regulations adopted thereunder.

ORDAINED, by the Middlesex County Board of Chosen Freeholders that the Middlesex County CEHA Recycling Generator Resolution is as follows:

Section I - Authority:

This Resolution is enacted pursuant to and consistent with the County Environmental Health Act, N.J.S.A. 26:3A2-21 et seq. and the Solid Waste Management Act, N.J.S.A. 13:1E-1 et seq., and the rules and regulations adopted thereunder.

Section II - Purpose:

This Resolution establishes penalty amounts for violations of unique recycling generator requirements found in the solid waste management plan for Middlesex County, which shall be assessed and collected by the County of Middlesex and its authorized solid waste agents, and as such, supplements the provisions its Solid Waste Management Plan as approved by NJDEP.

Section III - Requirements

Middlesex County Solid Waste Management Plan

Section C

6. Responsibilities of the County

b) Solid Waste Facility Inspection Program

Inspectors from the County Public Health Department and the Middlesex County Utilities Authority will conduct inspections for recyclables on a year-round basis at the Middlesex County Landfill (MCLF). The purpose of this inspection program is to assure that no recyclables are disposed at the County's disposal site. The inspectors will perform a thorough inspection of any load that is observed to contain readily visible amounts of designated recyclable materials. Spreading and covering of the load will be delayed while the inspection is conducted. If the inspection discloses a violation a Notice of Violation will be issued according to the provisions of this Plan.

Solid waste and recyclables haulers, municipal or private, are responsible for what they collect. They will be subject to inspections at transfer stations, landfills, and recycling facilities. If violations are disclosed enforcement action will be taken and penalties will be issued as provided in Appendix VI.

Since haulers are responsible for what they transport to the MCLF, Notices of Violation will be issued to the hauler. Penalties are assessed progressively based on the haulers' record of past violations and demonstrated results in working with generators to eliminate recyclables from the waste stream. The Department will attempt to identify the generator of the recyclables. Where generators can be identified the Recycling Generator Inspection Program will follow up with an inspection at the generator. Follow up inspections will be conducted and penalties will be issued if necessary to assure compliance.

10. Compliance By Generators

This section describes the required actions to be taken by generators of recyclables to ensure Middlesex County will meet and exceed the 60% recycling goal imposed by State Law.

a) Residential Compliance Requirements (single family and up to four-family houses)

Citizens are responsible for source separating mandated items according to municipal ordinances and consistent with the Middlesex County Solid Waste Management Plan and delivering them to the municipal collection system (whether curbside collection, bulk center or drop-off center). These items must be source separated; no mandated recyclables are permitted in the garbage put out for collection; no garbage is permitted in recyclables placed in the municipality's collection system.

b) Multi-family Compliance Requirements (condominiums, townhouses, low and high-rise apartments).

1. The owner/management is responsible for ensuring that a recycling system is established and that it is operated in compliance with the requirements of the municipal ordinance and this Plan. The owner/management is responsible for setting up and maintaining the recycling system. The owner/management is responsible for receiving and responding to Warnings, Notices of Violation, and Penalty Assessments and for correcting violations. The owner/management will be expected to correct violations promptly and to make necessary direct contacts with residents.

2. Drop-off centers (bulk centers) must be established and maintained so that they are conveniently accessible to residents. Curbside collection may be made available in place of, or in conjunction with, these drop-off centers. The recycling system must provide for all mandated recyclables in the residential waste stream. The recycling system may utilize separate containers for each recyclable material or it may provide for two or more materials to be placed in one container provided the recycling hauler can take the materials commingled. Containers must be clearly marked and the area neatly maintained. Container capacity must be adequate to hold the amount of materials generated between pick-ups. It must be clear to an inspector that the system is being serviced

3. It must be clear that the system is being used properly by employees and tenants. There must not be garbage in the recycling containers or recyclables in the garbage containers. The owner/management is responsible for resolving problems which may arise from the improper use of containers and for training employees and tenants to properly understand and use the recycling system.

4. Notification and collection rules shall be issued by the management to new tenants when they arrive and to all residents every three months. Copies of these notices, or other proof of distribution of the notices, must be sent to the municipal recycling coordinator at the time of each mailing or distribution.

5. The owner/management is responsible for arranging to have recyclables picked up and for resolving any problems with the transporter of recyclables.

6. The owner/management must arrange to obtain documentation in order to report the tonnages of materials recycled at least once per year (or as specified by the municipality) or else he/she must arrange to have the collector provide that documentation directly to the municipality. Arrangements with recycling companies or with haulers handling recyclables should include provisions for obtaining this information. Documentation must be maintained by the management. When the municipality provides recyclables collection service, reporting and proof are not needed.

7. Single/Dual Stream Recycling: Multi-family locations may opt to collect their recyclables in a single stream or dual stream (fiber, commingled) provided the Intermediate Processing Facility (IPF) that receives the material has certified that they have the ability to separate and maximize the capture rate of the mandated recyclables. The Division of Solid Waste Management will compile and maintain an updated list of those facilities.

c) Commercial and Institutional Compliance Requirements (retail, wholesale, restaurants, taverns, schools, institutions - including government, warehouses, construction sites, factories, offices, etc. but specifically excluding Fairs, Parks, Concerts, and other Outdoor Events – see section d)

1. The owner/operator (or in case of construction, the contractor), is responsible for ensuring that a recycling system is established and that it is operated in compliance with the requirements of the municipal ordinance and this Plan. The owner/operator/contractor is responsible for setting up and maintaining the recycling system. The owner/operator/contractor is responsible for receiving and responding to Warnings, Notices of Violation, and Penalty Assessments and for correcting violations promptly.

2. The recycling system must be established and maintained so that it is are conveniently accessible to users. The recycling system must provide for all mandated recyclables in the commercial waste stream. The recycling system may utilize separate containers for each recyclable material or it may provide for two or more materials to be placed in one container provided the recycling hauler can take the materials commingled. Containers must be clearly marked and the area neatly maintained. Container capacity must be adequate to hold the amount of materials generated between pick-ups. It must be clear to the inspector that the system is being serviced

3. The owner/operator/contractor must ensure that the system is being use properly by employees, customers or tenants. There must not be garbage in the recycling containers or recyclables in the garbage containers. The owner/operator/contractor is responsible for resolving problems which may arise from the improper use of containers and for instructing employees, tenants, and customers to understand and use the recycling system.

4. If patrons, customers or employees are involved in the waste disposal process (i.e. fast food stores or company cafeteria), the recycling system must allow for this and include notice to customers as to their responsibilities.

5. The owner/operator/contractor is responsible for arranging for recyclables to be removed from the premises and for assuring that they go into the recyclables market. The owner/operator/contractor may make arrangements to deliver the recyclables to the municipal collection system (drop-off center or curbside collection) if permitted by the municipality. Otherwise, the owner/operator/contractor is responsible for arranging to have recyclables picked up and for resolving any problems with the transporter of recyclables.

6. The owner/operator/contractor must arrange to obtain documentation in order to report the tonnages of materials recycled at least once per year (or as specified by the municipality) or else he/she must arrange to have the collector provide that documentation directly to the municipality.
7. Single/Dual Stream Recycling: Commercial and Institutional establishments may opt to collect their recyclables in a single stream or dual stream (fiber, commingled) provided the IPF that receives the material has certified that they have the ability to separate out and maximize the capture rate of the mandated recyclables. The Division will compile and maintain an updated list of those facilities.
8. Recycling Containers: Commercial and Institutional establishments that have outdoor garbage containers for their customers must also have outdoor recycling containers. There must be sufficient recycling containers for any mandated recyclables in the commercial/institutional waste stream.
9. All schools must provide written notice at the beginning of each school year, to all students, teachers, and other staff on the recycling requirements. The notice must contain a contact number to call if they observe any problems associated with recycling or if recycling is not properly occurring.
10. Single stream recycling of mixed classes of construction recyclables: Construction/Demolition sites may opt to collect all recyclables in one container provided there are no other materials (including garbage) in that container. To qualify for this provision, recyclables must go to a Transfer Station/MRF that is properly permitted by the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and has certified that they have the ability to separate out and maximize the capture rate of the mandated materials. The specific materials that may be commingled together will be determined by the provisions in the receiving Transfer Station/MRF's permit. The Division of Solid Waste Management will compile a list of eligible Transfer Station/MRFs and the respective eligible materials to be commingled. The Division will only include Transfer Station/MRFs on that list if they can demonstrate a minimum 70% recycling rate for ID 13C waste at their facility. All materials that go to the Transfer Station/MRF are subject to the Middlesex County Solid Waste Management Service Fee.

d) Requirements for Fairs, Parks, Concerts, Streets, and other Outdoor Events

1. The organizer/owner/contactor of the location must provide a recycling system that is operated in compliance with the requirements of the municipal ordinance and this Plan.
2. The recycling system must provide for any mandated recyclables generated at the event. It must be clear to an inspector that the system is being serviced: i.e., containers must be clearly marked and the area neatly maintained; there must not be garbage in the recyclables or recyclables in the garbage; container capacity must be adequate to hold materials between pick-ups. There must be sufficient recycling containers for any mandated recyclables generated at the event.
3. The organizer/owner/contactor is responsible for arranging for recyclables to be removed from the premises and for ensuring that they are taken to an approved recyclables market. The owner/operator/contractor may make arrangements to deliver the recyclables to the municipal collection system (drop-off center or curbside collection) if permitted by the municipality. Otherwise, the owner/operator/contractor is responsible for arranging to have recyclables collected and transported and for resolving any problems with the transporter of the recyclables.
4. The recycling system must be made accessible and available to all patrons, customers, and employees. Notice/signs must be provided to ensure all are aware of their responsibilities.
5. The owner/operator/contractor is responsible for obtaining pertinent documentation in order to report the tonnages of materials recycled at least once per year (or as specified by the municipality) or else he/she must arrange to have the collector provide that documentation directly to the municipality.

6. Single/Dual Stream Recycling: The recycling system may utilize separate containers for each recyclable material or it may provide for two or more materials to be placed in one container. Establishments may opt to collect their recyclables in a single stream or dual stream (fiber, commingled) provided the IPF that receives the material has certified that they have the ability to separate out and maximize the capture rate of the mandated recyclables. The Division of Solid Waste Management will compile and maintain an updated list of those facilities.

e) The Middlesex County Health Department may, at its discretion, elect to enter into an interagency agreement with the Division of Solid Waste Management and/or the Middlesex County Improvement Authority to provide for an additional Recycling Generator Inspector. The program will be under the authority and direction of the Middlesex County Health Department.

The day to day supervision of the inspector will be provided by the MCDSWM under the interagency agreement with the MCDPH.

The inspector will conduct inspections at schools and construction sites and also inspections of waste disposed at Middlesex County Landfill to ensure compliance with recycling requirements. The inspector may conduct inspections at additional types of facilities at the sole discretion of the Middlesex County Health Department.

The inspector will submit inspection reports to the Recycling Program Coordinator.

The Middlesex County Health Department will have the sole authority to process submitted reports and take the required enforcement actions. This will include the sole authority to issue and collect penalties. The Middlesex County Health Department shall, at its sole discretion, have the right to terminate this agreement at anytime.

11. Exemptions

b) 2. Properly licensed haulers utilizing a properly licensed Transfer Station/MRF who service commercial and institutional generators may not collect commingled garbage and recyclables without the generator having first obtained a duly authorized exemption from their respective municipality. Haulers servicing non-exempted generators (including residential/multi-family locations which are not allowed exemptions) shall not collect and mix in one vehicle the generator's garbage and source separated recyclables. Those haulers found to be mixing a non-exempted generator's garbage and recyclables will be in violation of the County Plan and subject to enforcement action and the imposition of penalties issued by the MCPHD as specified in Appendix VI.

Section IV - Enforcement and Penalties

The MCPHD is hereby individually and severally empowered to enforce the provisions of this Resolution.

(A) Violation of any provision of this Resolution shall be cause for an enforcement document to be issued to the violator according to procedures as establish by the Middlesex County's CEHA contract.

(B) Any person, corporation, occupant, or entity that violates or fails to comply with any provision of this Resolution or any of the rules and regulations promulgated hereunder shall be subject to penalties assessed according to provisions of appendix VI of the Middlesex County Solid Waste Management Plan:

Appendix VI**

Generator Penalties

For violations of Chapter 3, Section C.10;

1st offense - issue handwritten Notice of Noncompliance to the Generator or their representative on site at the completion of the inspection and mail a Notice of Violation (NOV). Both will be mailed to the Generator's mailing address if different from the location of violation.

2nd offense –initial penalty shall be \$100 per item violated.

Subsequent offenses result in the assessment of penalties according to the chart below up to a maximum of \$5,000.00 per day, per item violated.

3rd offense	\$ 500.00
4th offense	\$ 1000.00
5th offense	\$ 2500.00
6th and subsequent offenses	\$ 5,000.00

When an inspection discloses that a generator completely lacks a recycling system after having been issued a Notice of Violation the initial penalty assessment shall be \$500.00.

Continued failure to setup a system will result in a doubling of the penalty with each subsequent offense up to a maximum of \$5000.

The penalty aspect of this Generator enforcement procedure is deemed by the Middlesex County Public Health Department, Environmental Health Division - Solid Waste Program to be reasonable and conducive to settlement without cause for litigation with its associated costs. It is also expected to raise the awareness of the Generator and deter continued non-compliance with the recycling laws.

This procedure is subject to change as circumstances warrant.

Hauler Enforcement Protocol and Penalties

These penalties are established for violations of Chapter 3 Section C, Items 6.b) and 11.b2)

1st offense	\$500.00
2nd offense	\$1,000.00
3rd offense	\$2,500.00
4th offense	\$5,000.00
5th and subsequent offenses	\$10,000.00

The following penalties are established for hauler violations of Chapter 2, Section D of the Solid Waste Management Plan.

Non-Submittal and/or falsification of Monthly Tonnage Report; and/or non payment of Solid Waste Management Service fees:

1st offense\$ 750.00
2nd offense\$1,000.00

Each subsequent offense within a 12 month period shall double the penalty, i.e.

3rd offense \$2,000.00
4th offense \$4,000.00
5th offense \$8,000.00

Late Submittal of monthly Tonnage Report and/or non payment of Solid Waste Management Service Fees

\$50 per day up to 15 days,
after 15 days, offense is considered
Non-Submittal.

In the event the violator fails to achieve compliance after accruing substantial penalties, the Health Department may refer the violator to the Environmental Prosecutor for appropriate legal action.

Scrap Tire Enforcement Protocol and Penalties

Violators of Section 8 of Chapter 3B will be subject to notices of violations and penalty assessments. The range of penalties is \$750 - \$50,000 per occurrence. Penalties will be determined by the Public Health Department and shall be based on the severity of the violation and the cost of cleanup incurred by the County.

For the purpose of settling violations and to avoid the cost of unneeded litigation, the MCPHD shall have the right to negotiate with violators to reduce penalty amounts issued under this appendix. To be eligible for a penalty reduction a violator must achieve and remain in compliance. When circumstances warrant the Department may elect to hold in abeyance collection of penalties provided penalty amounts are modest and the violator remains in compliance.

(C) No provision of this resolution shall be construed to impair any common law or statutory cause of action, or legal remedy therefrom, of any person for injury or damage arising from any violation of this ordinance or from other law.

Section V - Severability and Repealer

This Resolution shall take effect immediately, unless otherwise provided by Resolution of the governing body.

(A) If any provision or portion of a provision of this Resolution is held to be unconstitutional, preempted by federal or State law, or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions of the ordinance shall not be invalidated.

(B) All ordinances or parts of ordinances, which are inconsistent with any provisions of this Resolution, are hereby repealed as to the extent of such inconsistencies.

In the event that it is determined, by a Court of competent jurisdiction, that any provision or section of this resolution is unconstitutional, all other sections and provisions shall remain in effect.

TRANSFER STATION/ MATERIAL RECOVERY FACILITY

TRUCK ROUTES

The 986 Jersey Avenue LLC. Transfer Station/Material Recovery Facility site is located on NJ Route 91 (Jersey Avenue) in the City of New Brunswick. In evaluating the available travels routes to and from the facility, certain criteria were used. These criteria were the classification of roadway, type of land development along the travel route, weight restrictions, and site specific concerns such as the location of schools, parks, etc. The transportation network that will service the facility is comprised of State and County highways.

TRUCK ROUTES

The following roads are designated as the truck routes to and from the facility.

1. NJ Route 91 (Jersey Avenue)-Urban Minor Arterial

Trucks will be allowed to use this roadway along its entire length between NJ Route 27 to the north and US Route 1 to the south.

2. US Route 1 - Urban Principal Arterial

Trucks will be allowed to use this roadway along its entire length of US Route1.

3. US Route 130 - Urban Principal Arterial

Trucks will be allowed to use this roadway along its entire length of US Route 130.

4. NJ Route 27 - Urban Principal Arterial

Trucks will be allowed to use this roadway along its entire length of NJ Route 27.

5. NJ Route 26 (Livingston Avenue) - Urban Minor Arterial

Trucks will not be allowed to use this roadway. The ONLY exception is that it may be used as a secondary route in case there is an event on NJ Route 91 (Jersey Avenue) that warrants an alternate travel route such as an accident, construction, etc., for only that period that NJ Route 91 (Jersey Avenue) is closed to traffic.

6. County Route 680 (How Lane) - Urban Collector

A) Trucks will be allowed to use this roadway between NJ Route 27 and NJ Route 91 (Jersey Avenue).

B) Trucks will not be allowed to use this roadway between NJ Route 26 (Livingston Avenue) and NJ Route 91 (Jersey Avenue). The ONLY exception is that it may be used as a secondary route in case there is an event on NJ Route 91 (Jersey Avenue) that warrants an alternate travel route such as an accident, construction, etc., for only that period that NJ Route 91 (Jersey Avenue) is closed to traffic.

7. Milltown Road (CR 606)

Trucks are not allowed to use this roadway.

8. Georges Road (NJ 171)

Trucks are not allowed to use this roadway.

9. Herman Road

Trucks are not allowed to use this roadway.

10. Cranbury Cross Road

Trucks are not allowed to use this roadway.

11. Adams Lane (CR 608)

Trucks are not allowed to use this roadway.

SOUTH PLAINFIELD TRANSFER AND RECYCLING CORP. TRANSFER STATION

Amend the Middlesex County Solid Waste Management Plan inclusion of the South Plainfield Transfer and Recycling Corp. Transfer Station located at Baldwin Street on Block 299, Lot 1 in the Borough of South Plainfield to include transportation routes for the facility. Vehicles traveling to and from the facility will use the following route: New Market Avenue to New Brunswick Avenue to Stelton Road to Interstate 287.

MONTECALVO DISPOSAL SERVICES, INC.

Introduction: Montecalvo Disposal Services, Inc. is located in the Keasbey section of Woodbridge Township, New Jersey. The site has barge and active rail access, as well as close proximity to most of Middlesex County's major truck routes. The Montecalvo site is zoned M-2 Heavy Industrial and is located amidst an area that has been in heavy industrial use for over 100 years.

Solid waste vehicles will access Montecalvo from the New Jersey Turnpike, Interstate 287, Route 440, State Route 1 and 9, and the Outerbridge Crossing from New York. The following are the routes vehicles will use coming off of each of these major transportation arteries:

From the New Jersey Turnpike Northbound or Southbound:

Turnpike Exit 10 to I-287 South/Route 440 North to Smith Street to Crows Mill Road.

From I-287 Southbound / Route 440 Northbound:

I-287 South to Route 440 North to Smith Street to Crows Mill Road.

From Route 9 Northbound:

Route 9 North to Route 440 North to Smith Street to Crows Mill Road.

From Routes 1&9 Southbound:

Route 9 South to Smith Street to Crows Mill Road.

From the Outerbridge Crossing & New York:

Outerbridge Crossing to Route 440 South to Industrial Rd./Riverside Dr. to Crows Mill Road (North) to Crows Mill Road (South).

ADMINISTRATIVE ACTION 003-12

REPUBLIC SERVICES - WOODBRIDGE TRANSFER STATION/MRF

The Keasbey TS/MRF (Republic Services of New Jersey, LLC d/b/a Midco Waste Systems-Woodbridge Transfer Station/MRF Facility) is located at 440 Smith Street, Keasbey, NJ 08832 (Block 57, Lots 1.021,2, and 3) in the Woodbridge Township, Middlesex County, and is operated by Republic Services of New Jersey, LLC, d/b/a Midco Waste Systems. The facility is authorized to accept and process solid waste types 10, 13, 13C, 23, and 27, and/or recyclable materials with a daily maximum capacity of 350 tons. The site is accessible by most of Middlesex County's major trucking routes and, subsequently, solid waste collection vehicles and transfer vehicles access the site by way of Smith Street. The Keasbey TS/MRF is located in a light industrial zone (M-I).
