Community Purpose

From 2018 to 2020, Middlesex County undertook a substantial public outreach campaign to inform the *Destination 2040 Strategic Plan* and specifically the *Open Space and Recreation Plan* (OSRP), engaging with 1,882 residents through a series of over a dozen meetings and an extensive online survey. This endeavor, spearheaded by the Public Outreach and Engagement Team (POET), a group within the Alan M. Voorhees Transportation Center (VTC) at the Edward J. Bloustein School of Planning and Public Policy at Rutgers University, featured the innovative "Set the Table!" initiative, blending civic dinner parties with collaborative forums, along with more traditional public input collected both online and in-person, to capture a diverse array of community input.



In response to the insights gleaned from these discussions, the specific project needs for Thomas A. Edison Park have been identified, ensuring that each initiative is closely aligned with both the OSRP's objectives and the expressed wishes of the county's residents. The identified project needs for the park are as follows:

- Fulfilling Deed Requirements and Strategic Goals
- Addressing Insufficient Capacity for Activities
- Lack of Diverse Sporting Options
- Improving Deteriorating Park Infrastructure
- Address Climate Resilience and Sustainability

These needs form the cornerstone of the proposed developments at Thomas A. Edison Park, ensuring that it will **not only meet current community standards but also adapt to future recreational requirements.**


Thomas A. Edison Park is and will continue to be a public park facility, created for the enjoyment of County residents and visitors.

Impact to Natural Landscape is Minimal




Thomas A. Edison Park is nestled in an urbanized area

Of the **180-acre** property that Thomas A. Edison Park sits on, of which 77 acres is developed with fields and paths and maintained as an active park, **ONLY 11 additional acres** will be converted to active parkland to enhance outdoor recreation and athletics for the regional community to enjoy.

Natural offerings will be bolstered


Only 4.5 net acres out of 55 total acres of wooded vegetation and trees will be removed to facilitate these park enhancements.

To augment the remaining 50 acres of forested area, additional native vegetation, newly planted trees, and benches will be added along pathways through and around the park and woods, providing beautiful and safe areas for walking and bird watching. New trails will connect to the College, Raritan Center, and the park's undeveloped southern portion.

Additionally, the community can witness the growth of **a newly added threeacre successional meadow**, which will become part of the forest, offering a new nature experience.



New Water Management Mitigates Flooding
